II. Catalog Description

Prerequisite: ENGL 111 English Composition I. A Workshop course designed to encourage and develop a student's creative talents in writing. The instructor will teach two genres from among the following four genres: poetry, fiction, nonfiction, dramatic writing. Students will analyze and critique their peers' manuscripts as well as examples of published work.

III. Statement of Course Need

A. Creative Writing satisfies the need of a growing population of students who wish to pursue imaginative writing and perfect the crafts of poetry, fiction, nonfiction, and dramatic writing. The course will offer interested students the opportunity to

explore the use of voice in their own texts and prepare them to employ the terminology of that craft. Research reveals that many four-year institutions in New Jersey have equivalent courses to English 248, ensuring successful transferability for students. Overall, for the major and non-major alike, Creative Writing exposes students to the kinds of discussions and assignments they will encounter in writing workshops, both at RVCC and other institutions.
