STATE HONORS.

Raritan Valley Community College students **Jonathan Avelar Flores** of Phillipsburg and **Amodh Naik** of Bridgewater have been named to the **2025 New Jersey All-State Academic Team**, it was announced by the New Jersey Council of County Colleges (NJCCC). They join a group of 35 students from the state's 18 community colleges who are being honored.

All of the honorees are members of Phi Theta Kappa, the national honor society for community college students, and were nominated by their college leaders for their academic performance, leadership, and contributions to both their campus and community.

In addition, **Amodh Naik** has received a prestigious **Coca-Cola Gold Scholarship**, which is awarded by the **Coca-Cola Foundation** in partnership with Phi Theta Kappa. Naik is one of six New Jersey community college students receiving competitive scholarships recognizing academic achievement, leadership, and engagement in college and community service. Recipients were nominated by their college administrators.

Students selected to the 2025 All-State Academic Team represent a broad range of academic disciplines, including biology (pre-medicine), business administration, education, engineering, healthcare, liberal arts, physics, psychology, and the sciences. The group includes students who plan to transfer to four-year institutions and those entering the workforce after graduation.

KESSELMAN FELLOW NAMED.

RVCC student **Manuela Bulgaro** has been named the **Engage NJ Kesselman Fellow for the Advancement of Democracy** for the 2025-2026 academic year, it was announced by **The Pray Family Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement at RVCC**.

In that role, Bulgaro, a second-year Honors College student majoring in Social Sciences, is co-developing the project, *The Republic We Keep, A Podcast on American Systems, Voices, & Values*.

The Republic We Keep is a student-led civic podcast created by Bulgaro and **Aiden Annis**, a Rutgers University sophomore who is majoring in Electrical Engineering and minoring in Political Science. The Fellowship includes a \$1,000 honorarium to support the project during the academic year.

“Former Engage NJ board chair and president of Stockton University, **Dr. Harvey Kesselman**, continues even now in retirement to be an advocate for the advancement of human rights. RVCC’s Kesselman Fellows seek to walk a similar path with their project called, *The Republic We Keep*. And so, when I look to the future state of justice and opportunity here in New Jersey, I am confident that Manuela and Aiden will be

the future we want to see for our citizenry,” said Dr. Saul Petersen, Executive Director, Engage NJ.

In addition to the honorarium, the Fellowship provides professional pathway coaching and the chance to participate in a series of skills development opportunities focusing on such areas as consensus-building, public speaking, and professional communication, designed to meet students’ self-identified needs. Bulgaro and Annis also will have the opportunity to work with other student Fellows nationwide.

Through honest and thoughtful conversations, *The Republic We Keep* podcast created by Bulgaro and Annis focuses on how American systems—such as healthcare, education, justice, and immigration—impact people’s lives and explores what it takes to build a more informed and engaged generation of citizens. Guest juror **Otis Kriegel**, a New York City-based public artist and author, evaluated all the entries and made the final selections for the exhibition, and determined the “Best in Show” award winners. Overall Best in Show honors went to digital and mixed media artist, **Erica Yoo**, for her **OCD Archives** (set of 4 fully-designed CD) from her Fall 2025 Digital Artmaking course. 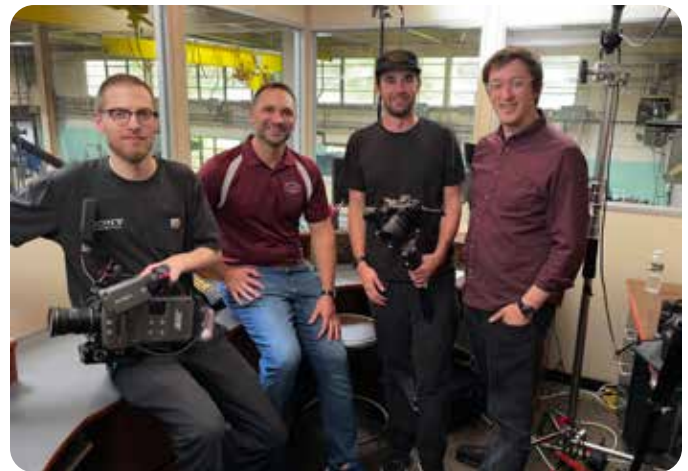

Stephanie Spies - Class of 2014

Stephanie graduated from the RVCC Honors College in 2014 with an Associate of Science in Business Administration. She then transferred to William Paterson University, where she double-majored in accounting and financial planning. Stephanie began her career as a financial planner at Modera Wealth Management in 2017 and is now a Senior Financial Advisor and Principal at the firm. Her position involves educating her clients about retirement planning, tax planning, estate planning, risk management, and investments. In addition to her work with Modera, Stephanie works as an adjunct professor at William Paterson University, educating the next generation of financial planners. Outside of work, Stephanie has served on various committees both inside and outside of her profession, including her role as board treasurer of The Princess Program STEM, a California-based nonprofit that seeks to encourage young girls to enter STEM-related fields. In its first year, The Princess Program STEM has reached over 2,000 young girls across the country through various STEM-related activities. Stephanie gives back to RVCC whenever she can, frequently serving as a panelist for career exploration and mentorship events focused on educating RVCC's business students.



Jenna Douglas - Class of 2017

Jenna graduated summa cum laude from RVCC's Honors College in 2017 with an Associate of Arts in Liberal Arts–Social Science. While at RVCC, Jenna was actively involved with both the Phi Theta Kappa honor society and Rotaract; received the Nota Bene Academic Achievement Award; served as a Student Ambassador; and also participated in the Asha Project in Nepal, where she helped distribute school supplies to students in remote villages. Jenna then transferred to Georgetown University, graduating magna cum laude. While there, Jenna served as a leader in Georgetown's Alternative Breaks Program, coordinating community-based service experiences focused on social justice education and student engagement. After graduating, Jenna worked on Capitol Hill as an education public policy and advocacy intern, informing Congressional staff about educational disparities. Jenna continued serving the Washington, DC community as both a mentor and English-language instructor for ELL learners. Next, Jenna joined the Aspen Institute Education & Society Program, where she designed and delivered strategic learning experiences that equipped K-12 leaders with the necessary tools to advance equity and improve student outcomes. Jenna's career then led her to becoming a Strategy & Transformation Consultant at Deloitte Consulting, where she supported institution-wide transformations for colleges and universities. In 2023, Jenna was selected as a Fulbright Scholar, serving as an English Teaching Assistant in La Rioja, Spain.

Leilani Rose graduated from Raritan Valley Community College in 2019 with an Associate of Science in Digital Media/Film Studies. While at RVCC, she was a member of the Sigma Kappa Delta English Language honor society and served as President of the Phi Theta Kappa honor society, leading the chapter to multiple international and regional awards and earning the College's Distinguished Club President Award. She later pursued a Bachelor of Arts in Individualized Studies through the University of New Hampshire College of Professional Studies. During her education, Rose served as an emergency medical technician and volunteer firefighter and helped run the Spreading Smiles initiative at Chabad of Hunterdon, providing weekly care packages to sick and elderly community members. She began her career in journalism and international reporting, including work as a technology correspondent based in Tel Aviv, while also participating in volunteer initiatives abroad. Rose later joined First Street Foundation, where she helped launch the first publicly available flood-risk data platform in the United States, now known as Risk Factor. She then spent several years in strategic communications and healthcare advertising, holding senior creative and leadership roles at IPG Health and Publicis Groupe and leading campaigns across rare disease, public health, and therapeutic innovation for organizations including Merck, Pfizer, Novo Nordisk, Bristol Myers Squibb, AstraZeneca, and Procter & Gamble. Drawing on this background, Rose became a two-time wellness brand founder and is currently a nutritionist and Yoga Alliance–certified yoga instructor (RYT-200), co-owning Envision Health and Fitness in Califon and Gladstone, New Jersey.

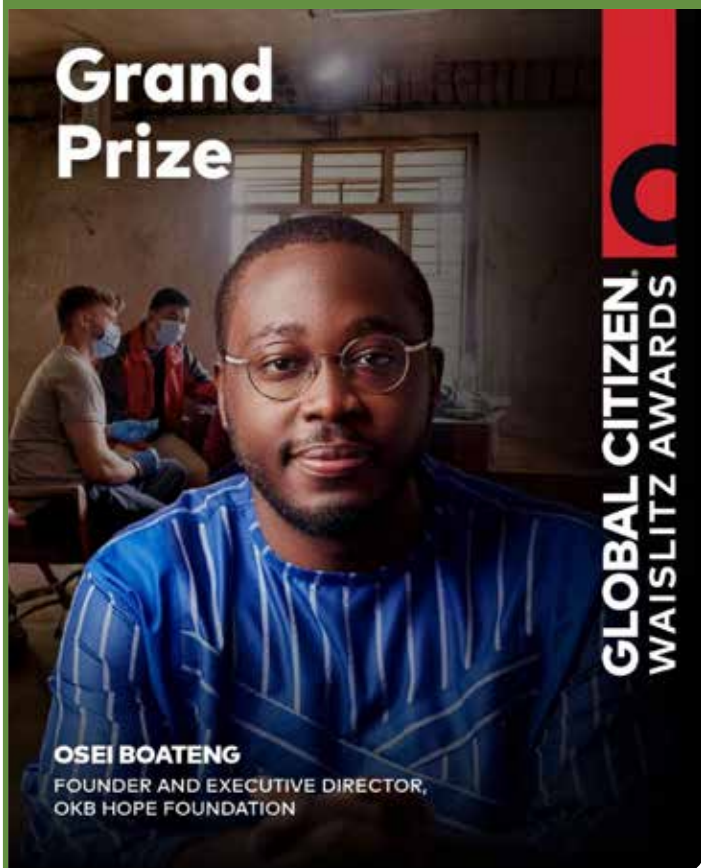
Clark, who majored in Visual Arts at the College, recently began working as a 3D artist for FOX Sports. His projects have included helping to create the set for Season 11 of Fox NFL Kickoff.

Clark was part of the team that handled the primary modeling and texturing of the broadcast’s set, using computer graphics (CG). Working with Pixotope, a type of virtual production software, and Unreal Engine, a game engine used for creating interactive 3D graphics and immersive virtual experiences, Clark and his teammates created everything that appears in the set—besides the actual people and the desk.

After graduating from RVCC with an AFA in Visual Arts, Clark transferred to **Gnomon School of VFX, Games, and Animation** in North Hollywood, CA, where he earned his BFA and studied 3D/CG, specializing in modeling, texturing, lighting, look development, compositing, and generalist work. Said Ethan, “I love to share my story as I believe it’s great to pass experiences along to the next generation of students and to help show them what they’re capable of.”

ANSWERING THE CALL.

It was more recognition for the brilliant work and impact of **Osei Kwadwo Boateng** (RVCC Class of 2016) and the **OKB Hope Foundation**, the organization he founded and leads. Osei was awarded the GRAND PRIZE by the **Global Citizen Waislitz Awards** in recognition of his social impact work with those experiencing extreme poverty. Osei is a healthcare entrepreneur from Ghana whose mission is driven by personal loss. After losing his grandmother and aunt to preventable conditions due to poor access to care, he committed his life to transforming healthcare for underserved communities. He founded the OKB Hope Foundation to provide primary and preventive care through health vans equipped with medical supplies and staffed by experienced healthcare providers. Under his leadership, the foundation has served over 10,000 individuals in 80 rural communities and delivered mental health education and resources to over 3,000 students.

NEWMAN CIVIC FELLOW NAMED.

RVCC graduate **Lila Seroy** of Whitehouse Station has been named a **Newman Civic Fellow** by **Campus Compact**, a national coalition of colleges and universities working to advance the public purposes of higher education.

Seroy, a Business major who graduated from RVCC in May, is currently a student at **Stanford University**. She joins a group of student civic leaders from 38 states; Washington, DC; and Mexico who comprise the 2025-2026 cohort of Newman Civic Fellows.

The Newman Civic Fellowship is a yearlong program that recognizes students who stand out for their leadership potential and commitment to creating positive change in communities. The fellowship is named for the late Frank Newman, one of Campus Compact's founders, who was a tireless advocate for civic engagement in higher education. In the spirit of Dr. Newman's leadership, each fellow is nominated by their campus president or chancellor, who is invited to select one exemplary community-committed student from their campus each year.



"It is an honor to welcome this group of accomplished and dedicated students to the Newman Civic Fellowship," said Campus Compact President Bobbie Laur. "As higher education faces unprecedented challenges, these students exemplify the power and possibility of civic and community engagement on campus. As they emerge as the leaders of tomorrow, we are proud that this fellowship will be part of their story. From a variety of institutions and with diverse backgrounds and experiences, these fellows represent a bright future for public problem solving."

Through the fellowship, Campus Compact provides the students with learning and networking opportunities that help to nurture their development as civic leaders. Programming emphasizes personal, professional, and civic growth that can empower them to collaborate effectively across disciplines and create large-scale positive change.

The cornerstone of the fellowship is the Annual Convening of Newman Civic Fellows, which offers intensive in-person skill-building and networking over three days. The fellowship also provides fellows with pathways to apply for exclusive opportunities, including mini-grants to help fund community projects, scholarships, and post-graduate opportunities.

The Pray Family Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement at Raritan Valley Community College is providing a generous stipend to support Seroy's participation in the fellowship.

"We are extremely honored that Lila Seroy has been recognized nationally and named a Newman Civic Fellow. Lila has been a dedicated student leader at Raritan Valley Community College, and she exemplifies an unwavering commitment to advocacy, community empowerment, and education for disadvantaged youth through her work at Visions and Pathways, a local nonprofit that supports at-risk and homeless youth," said RVCC President **Dr. Michael J. AN EVENING OF *Generosity & Gratitude*



CELEBRATING GENEROSITY AND GRATITUDE.

There were little moments—and big news—as the RVCC community came together to raise funds (and donate food products) to address food insecurity on the campus of Raritan Valley Community College. Some 80 guests attended last month's "*An Evening of Generosity & Gratitude*" event, which required a donation of \$30—in **ShopRite** gift cards, grab-and-go food items, or as a financial contribution. And each \$30 earned a 2X match from the Board of Directors of the RVCC Foundation—initiated by vice chair, **Dan Van Tran**—for every attendee. In total, some \$68,000 was raised—thanks in large part to a \$50,000 anonymous gift to the **RVCC Resource Center & Food Pantry**, which was announced as part of the celebration. The event was also a ceremonial kickoff for the last stretch of the RVCC Foundation's end-of-year fundraising campaign, which seeks to bring in more support for RVCC students facing food insecurity. NEW LIFE FOR A LEGACY.



Last summer, friends and trustees of the **J.S. Henderson Memorial Adult Scholarship Fund** met for one last annual dinner. The event was an opportunity to reflect back on 39 years of providing scholarships to 99 grateful beneficiaries—and agree on an important decision: to keep the scholarship going in perpetuity, its management and stewardship was transferred to the RVCC Foundation, along with a new endowed fund to ensure the scholarship's permanent vitality. The board's \$129,228 donation has established the *"J.S. Henderson Memorial Adult Scholarship at Raritan Valley Community College."*

"On behalf of the J.S. Henderson Memorial Adult Scholarship Fund Board of Trustees, we're pleased to make this commitment to the RVCC Foundation to ensure the legacy of Jessamine Henderson—and her longtime advocacy of providing opportunities to adults for continuing their education—carries on in perpetuity," said **Dr. Andrew J. For five RVCC students enrolled in an Independent Study class with **Professor of Theatre Dennis Russo**, their experience took on a much greater meaning.

The students, **Arielle (Ari) Bowie**, **Kelly Deo**, **Asher Lindsey**, **Nazar Turchyn**, and **Fallon Billy**, participated in a workshop theatre experience with adult artists in the **Matheny Arts Access Program**, which “empowers individuals with disabilities to create art without boundaries.”

After several weeks rehearsing together, the RVCC students joined Matheny artists Cheryl Chapin, Chet Cheesman, Paul Santo, Karen Yates, and Amy Myers for “A Summer Drama Event” at the Matheny Adult Day Program in Hillsborough.

The event featured monologues and scenes written by the Matheny actors that were performed by RVCC students; short scenes presented together by Matheny actors and RVCC students, written by Russo; and group acting exercises.

“I’ve never really worked with people with disabilities,” says Theatre major Kelly Deo. “I’ve learned so much about them. They’ve surprised me in so many ways. They’re the ones writing the material [that we’re performing]. They’re endlessly creative,” she continues.

“This collaboration with Matheny Arts Access is celebrated as a Theatre endeavor, but to me it’s bigger than that—it’s a Human endeavor that just happens to exercise our creative muscle,” says Russo. “Sitting next to disabled actors and writers and working on a scene together; that’s a different

level of interaction. It’s much deeper.”

The partnership between Matheny and RVCC began in 2015, but the groups had not worked together since before the pandemic, and Russo was happy to resume the relationship. “This collaboration has been one of the highlights of my time teaching at RVCC,” he says.

Adds **Heather Williams, Program Director of Matheny Arts Access**: “The RVCC partnership was always such a highlight for our aspiring actors and playwrights. It gave them a sense of college life and increased their community engagement.”

Theatre major Asher Lindsey says working with the Matheny artists has helped him as a performer and a writer. “It shows me how theatre can impact everyone in a community and the arts are a way to bring people together.”

RECORD YEAR.

It was an incredible, record-setting year for the **RVCC Foundation**, surpassing the \$2 million mark for the first time in the College's history. The funds raised in 2024-2025—\$2,014,187—is \$971,431 higher than the previous year's total.

Among the highlights of the year was a record-setting "Giving Day," during which \$203,655 was raised over 24-hours for scholarships, student clubs, athletic teams, and a range of centers, institutes, and critical programs at RVCC. Energized by the return of a \$50,000 "match challenge," which was fueled by the generosity of **Jim and Jill Gibson** of Basking Ridge and **The Caruso Family Foundation**—and inspired the largest single Giving Day gift ever: a \$50,000 contribution from Lori Grossi of Clinton.

The year's fundraising tally also was aided by the incredible generosity of **Frank and Pat Russo**, whose longstanding scholarship at RVCC is among the most generous. The Russos' \$375,000 gift—the largest scholarship commitment in the College's history—provides five full scholarships for RVCC students in each of the next 10 years. Also adding large, six-figure gifts were **Johnson & Johnson** in support of the nascent NJBioFutures, and J.S. Henderson Foundation, whose board chose the RVCC Foundation to assume full management and stewardship of the **J.S. Henderson Memorial Adult Scholarship**—to be exclusively available to students at Raritan Valley Community College in perpetuity. Also notable in the year's fundraising success: \$153,000 in proceeds from the 21st Annual RVCC Foundation Golf Classic, which was held at **Neshanic Valley Golf Club**.

"Our record fundraising success this year is a direct testament to the generosity of our expanding donor community, and their willingness to step up," said Mike Marion, Executive Director, RVCC Foundation and RVCC Alumni Association. "We had 306 new donors add to the incredible support of our longstanding benefactors. It is so encouraging that more and more people are recognizing the value and importance of this exceptional institution and are choosing to be part of it."

STUDENT SAVINGS GROWS THROUGH OPEN EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES.



Raritan Valley Community College continues to help students reduce their educational costs by providing free instructional materials in a growing number of classes. Since 2018, the use of free **Open Educational Resources** (OER) has saved RVCC students \$6,162,077.07.

OER are free online resources that can be downloaded, edited, and shared. In addition to the cost savings, students benefit by using course materials that can easily be customized by their professors.

The College currently offers 70 distinct courses for which students can register to take the class with no-textbook costs. The number of sections that have no-textbook cost has increased each semester, as faculty adopt the OER that their colleagues have developed for those courses. When students register for classes, they can see if a course has a zero-textbook cost or a low-textbook cost of less than \$45. They also can search for “no-cost” and “low-cost” courses as they are building their schedule.

Many RVCC faculty members are doing their part to assist students by embracing the use of OER in their classrooms. The College’s faculty have published five OER textbooks that can be adopted by others, with four more in development. Two of those are for English Composition I and English Composition II

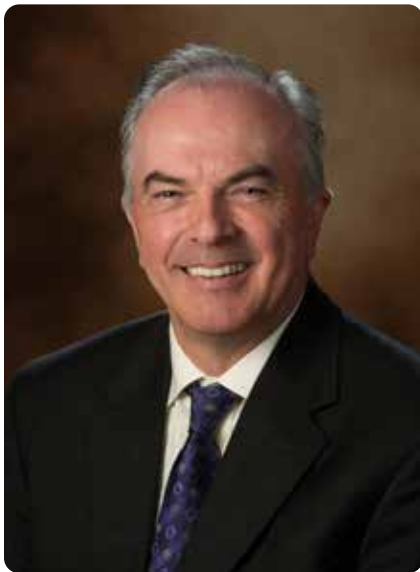
classes, which will offer savings for all RVCC students who are required to take these courses for their major. The English Department has been making significant revisions and updates to its English Composition courses, which include a department-wide decision to use OER beginning in fall 2026.

“Those of us that worked on the English Composition I and II Pressbooks were excited that the platform allowed us to use and remix existing content and write and create our own. We now have customized digital textbooks for both courses that align with our course outcomes and communicate our pedagogical priorities,” says **Jessica Darkenwald-DeCola**, Associate Professor of English. “We are in the process of piloting the English Composition I book this fall, and we will pilot the English Composition II book in the spring. An added benefit of OER and Pressbooks is that we’ll be able to continually revise, refine, and add to the textbooks in response to student feedback and our experiences teaching with the books,” she continues.

OER is also being used in English as a Second Language classes. “Despite years of searching, I could never find a writing textbook that fully met the needs of my intermediate multilingual writing students. As a result, I created my own materials, but they were disorganized across separate documents and platforms. Creating an OER textbook allowed me to bring all these materials together; I was able to write one interactive textbook tailored to the unique needs and preferences of my writing students,” adds **Lindsey Hageman**, Instructor of English as a Second Language, who created an OER textbook for students in the Advanced English Reading & Writing III class.

When surveyed, 65% of RVCC students reported that using OER improved their ability to complete assignments; 55% said it increased their satisfaction of the learning experience; and 50% reported that it increased their interest in the subject or assigned readings. In addition, 95% of students surveyed said they would take another OER course or recommend an OER course to a friend. Students said they appreciate being able to access their course materials anytime and at any place they need them, and they find the OER easy to use.

RVCC PRESIDENT NAMED TO NJBIZ 2025 EDUCATION POWER LIST.



EDUCATION POWER LIST

RVCC President **Dr. Michael J. McDonough** has been selected as part of **NJBIZ's 2025 Education Power List**. The recognition of McDonough, who took over as president at Raritan Valley Community College in 2014, is in acknowledgment of the many accomplishments he has helped achieve. Today, RVCC enrolls approximately 6,800 students, a total McDonough has helped build steadily through aggressive marketing and outreach after the impacts of the pandemic.

This year, the school adopted a new, five-year strategic plan, "Leading Change, Inspiring Possibility." Commenting on the outline, McDonough noted colleges must not only accept change but embrace it amid an evolving learning landscape. The plan focuses on enhancing "academic, community, and corporate partnerships; an investment in resources to keep pace with a changing workforce; and an obligation to deliver an affordable, accessible education."

In February, RVCC was an integral part of the launch of **NJBioFutures**, a public-private workforce development partnership that will serve the state's expanding cell and gene therapy sector—to which **Johnson & Johnson** contributed \$1 million as founding sponsor. RVCC is also a leader in the area of operational sustainability, recognized at both the national and state levels for

its stellar environmental practices. For the 2025 fiscal year, the RVCC Foundation also set a new fundraising record, surpassing the \$2 million mark for the first time in the College's history. McDonough is also active in the community college sector, serving as chair of the Executive Committee of the **New Jersey Community College Consortium for Workforce and Economic Development**, and chair of the Academic Issues Committee; he is a board member for **Engage NJ**.

NEW DATA SCIENCE OFFERING.



Students interested in pursuing a degree focusing on the growing area of Data Science will have a new opportunity at RVCC with the Computer Science program's Data Science Option.

The Data Science Option will prepare students to transfer into bachelor's degree programs at four-year colleges and universities in a variety of areas, including Computer Science, Data Science, Business, Economics, and related fields and subsequently enroll in higher level Data Science courses. The new Option follows the guidelines set by the Association of Computer Machinery (ACM).

"We are excited to offer the new Data Science Option for Raritan Valley Community College's Computer Science program, which will educate students in an area that in the past was mainly taught only at four-year colleges and in master's degree programs. At RVCC, students pursuing their associate degree will now be

introduced to this rapidly expanding field, which has an expected average future job growth of more than 17%,” said **Sarah Imbriglio**, RVCC Dean of STEM.

The Data Science track focuses on an Introduction to Data Science using the R programming language and Data Management using the Python programming language and its libraries. Students pursuing the Option will strengthen their practical knowledge by working with real-life data in hands-on applications and projects.

In addition, those interested in learning more about Data Science who are not Computer Science students—such as people interested in fields like marketing, finance, business, healthcare, and technology—may enroll in the program’s Data Science and Data Management courses.

The Data Science Option includes courses focusing on such subjects as Data Science, Statistics, Data Structures, Analytical Physics, Data Management, Computer Architecture and Assembly Language, Linear Algebra, and Calculus, as well as classes in the humanities, social science, English composition, and Computer Science electives.

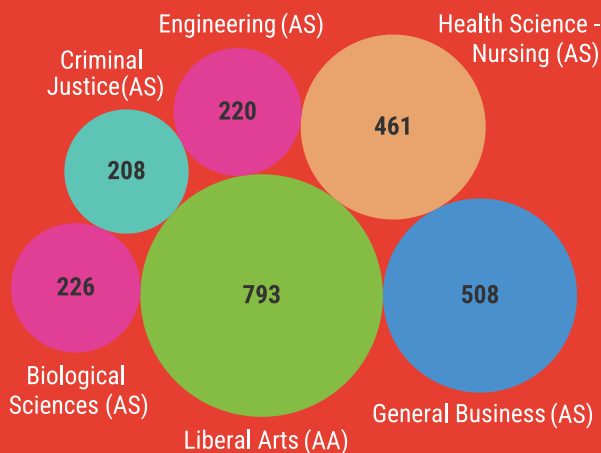

HEY, WE'RE NUMBER ONE (AGAIN!).

Raritan Valley Community College continues to set the standard for managing a complex physical operation, sustainably! The College was once again ranked as the “TOP US COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOR SUSTAINABILITY ACHIEVEMENTS” in the 2025 Sustainable Campus Index.

A publication from the **Association for the Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education** (AASHE), the Sustainable Campus Index recognizes top-performing sustainable colleges and universities overall and in 13 impact areas, as measured through the Sustainability Tracking, Assessment & Rating System (STARS®).

Some fun facts: It's the 11th year in a row Raritan Valley Community College has been similarly recognized. RVCC has cut its campus energy emissions by 58% since 2005. The College is **River Friendly**, as well as a **Bee Campus USA** affiliate and **Monarch Watch** certified. RVCC has three solar installations, a greenhouse, 12 new publicly available electric car charging stations, a green roof and a green wall, numerous pollinator gardens, a rain garden, three rainwater harvesting systems, and three buildings built to LEED standards.

“The College’s commitment to sustainability is one of the central themes of its new, five-year Strategic Plan, which calls on RVCC to ‘lead with sustainability by embedding environmentally responsible practices within educational experiences and every aspect of campus operations,’” RVCC President **Michael McDonough** said.

“All of us at AASHE are delighted to highlight Raritan Valley Community College in the 2025 Sustainable Campus Index,” said AASHE’s Executive Director, **Meghan Fay Zahniser**. “Your innovative and high-impact initiative demonstrates what is possible when colleges and universities embrace sustainability as a core value. By modeling bold action, your institution inspires peers across higher education and strengthens the collective progress we are making toward addressing global sustainability challenges.”

PROFESSOR CO-LEADS PROJECT ON OPEN SCIENCE RESOURCES.



Dr. Melanie Lenahan, Professor of Biology, is joining Karen Cangialosi (RIOS Institute), Sam Donovan (BioQUEST Curriculum Consortium), Carlos Goller (North Carolina State University), and Carrie Diaz (Bates College) as a co-lead on a new project: *“Developing Resources for an Undergraduate Open Science–Open Pedagogy Program.”*

The project aims to create openly licensed, adaptable materials that faculty can use to build a comprehensive undergraduate open science education program. As a co-lead, Dr. Lenahan will develop assignments and courses that incorporate alternative grading, open pedagogy, and science education reform.

By educating undergraduate students, the project team seeks to prepare future scientists to work within more open, collaborative, and inclusive frameworks. And for students who go on to other careers, understanding the value of open science will also serve them well as informed members of the public.

This funded initiative is part of the **Open Research Community Accelerator (ORCA)**, which supports the adoption of open science through collaborations that drive systems-level change. With support from the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative, ORCA has launched the Open Scholarship Catalytic Awards Program, which funds small projects that promote transparency, reproducibility, community engagement, and other open-sharing practices at traditionally under-resourced U.S. institutions.

PILLAR IN THE COMMUNITY.

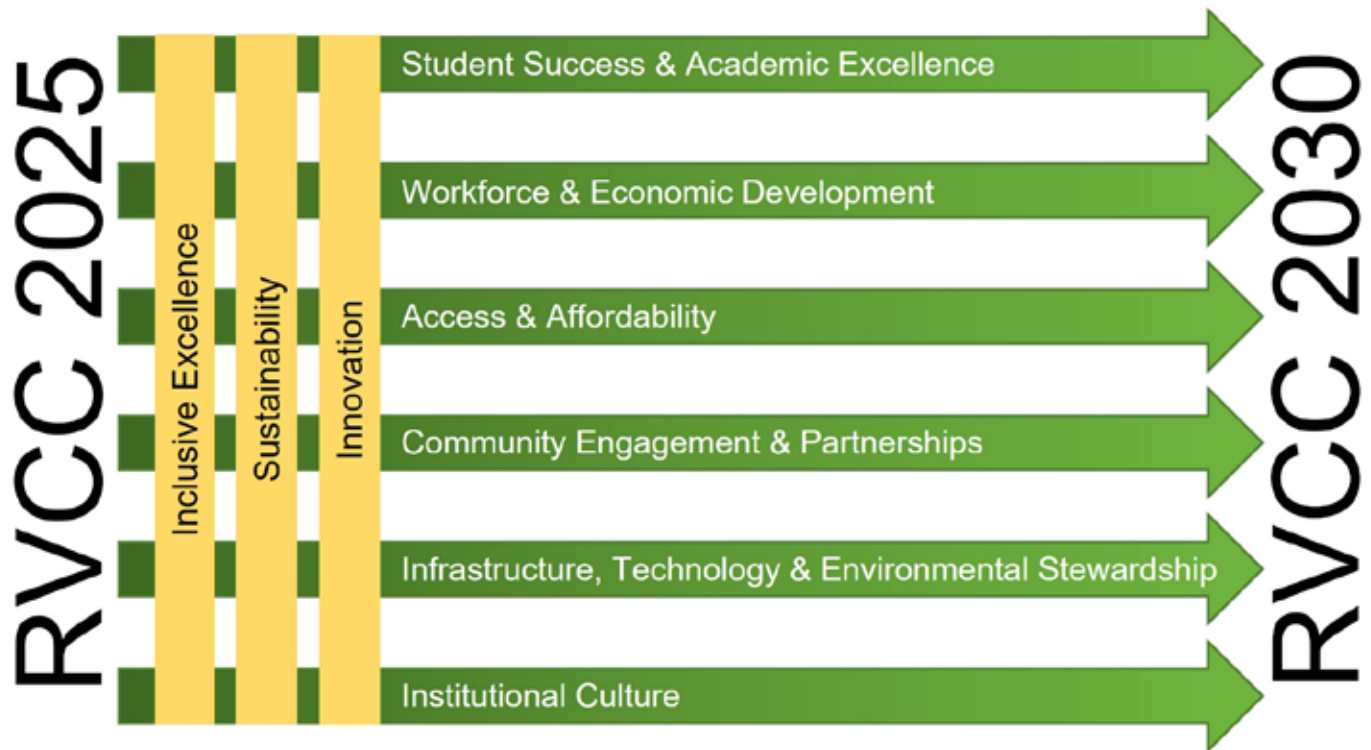

With approval from the RVCC Board of Trustees, the College has launched a new strategic plan, “**2025-2030 Strategic Plan: Leading Change, Inspiring Possibility**,” focusing on six themes: Student Success & Academic Excellence; Workforce & Economic Development; Access & Affordability; Community Engagement & Partnership; Infrastructure, Technology & Environmental Stewardship; and Institutional Culture.

Raritan Valley Community College’s new Strategic Plan focuses on our commitment to student success through the enhancement of academic, community, and corporate partnerships; an investment in resources to keep pace with a changing workforce; and an obligation to deliver an affordable, accessible education to help transform our inspiring students’ lives,” said RVCC President **Michael J. McDonough**.

In fall 2024, a Strategic Planning Committee was formed representing all constituencies of the RVCC community, including students and the Board of Trustees. The committee then hosted numerous focus groups and requested electronic survey feedback to discover relevant themes that represent the College’s collective goals for the future. Presentations were then made to the College community and at Board of Trustees Strategy and Vision Committee meetings throughout the spring 2025 semester, in conjunction with the Strategic Planning Committee’s biweekly gatherings, to develop plan details based on constituent comments and to provide updates. Additional feedback was collected during and after each presentation, resulting in the final Strategic Plan presented and approved in May 2025.

THE LAST WORD GRATITUDE.

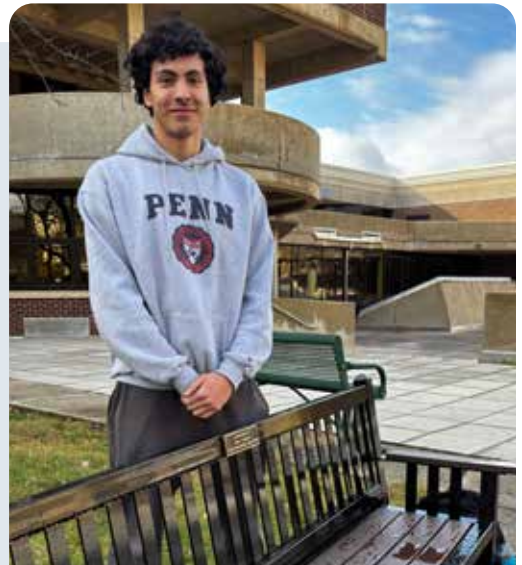
To the Rosero Family,

I come from a first-generation household, where neither of my parents' attended college and both immigrated to the U.S. in their mid-20s (father from Peru, mother from Colombia). I know that their process was particularly difficult, and my mom specifically had a hard-time getting citizenship. She did not speak the language when she came, and had to work extremely hard to eventually find a consistent home for herself.

I admire that Kevin wanted to make immigration easier for individuals like my mother, and I thought that was really commendable. I want to study some degree of political science when I eventually transfer from Raritan Valley Community College, and my family has instilled in me values of respect and empathy for immigrants. My dad routinely sends money to immigrants who do not have access to the resources that they need, and I also plan on continuing that family tradition when I grow older as well.

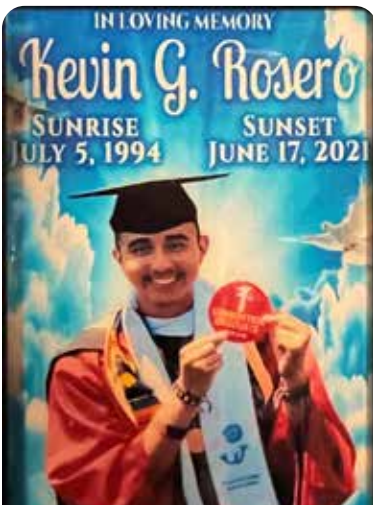
Kevin's values are ones that I greatly admire and will try to uphold in my life, and I offer my deepest thanks for being awarded the scholarship that bears his name.
