II.	I. Catalog Description	

Prerequisites: ARTS-110 Basic Drawing I

This course is an introduction to the techniques and aesthetics of watercolor. Gouache will be introduced as a minor element. Self- expression will be encouraged through creative problems. Color theory and methods of applying paint will be explored. Students will work from both indoors and outdoors from still life, nature, the figure model, self-portraits, and from their imaginations. Students will purchase their own art supplies.

#### **III.** Statement of Course Need

- A. This course fulfills the Beginning Studio Art Elective requirement in the A.F.A. Visual Arts Degree. Watercolor is particularly relevant to students interested in pursuing careers as studio artists. It is also of interest to lifelong learning students.
- B. This course has a lab component because it is a studio art course and requires students to use special facilities such as a drawing studio, and to use art materials under the guidance of the instructor.
- C. This course generally transfers as a studio art program elective dependent on the institution.

### IV. Place of Course in College Curriculum

- A. Free Elective
- B. This course does not serve as a General Education course.
- C. This course meets a program requirement for A.F.A. Visual Arts beginning studio art elective.

#### V. Outline of Course Content

- A. Various instructor demonstrations as needed.
- B. Development of wash techniques, including; flat wash, graded wash, edge shading.
- C. Glazing with watercolor to develop mixtures of colors.
- D. Mixing colors on palette and directly applying to paper (as oppose to mixing via glazes).
- E. Working wet into wet.
- F. Working on pre-moistened paper.
- G. Development of gouache techniques (an opaque medium).
- H. Introduction of collage with watercolor.

- I. Mixed media with watercolor such as water soluble pencils and crayons, and India ink, waxy crayons, and gouache.
- J. Developing realism, abstraction and non-objective space with watercolor.
- K. Splattering technique.
- L. Introduction of a basic Color theory
- M. Subject matter:
  - 1. Still life
  - 2. Landscape, painted on site if weather permitting
  - 3. The figure model and portraiture
- N. Critiques conducted throughout the semester, as a group and with individual students.
- O. One written critical analysis paper of a watercolor painting/s viewed on exhibit at a museum or gallery.
- P. Students will be encouraged to research various historical and contemporary artists and to assimilate their approaches and techniques when advantageous.

At the completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Develop and demonstrate critical analytic skill both verbally and in written format. (GE 1, 6)
- 2. Develop knowledge of a wide spectrum of paintings from various eras and cultures, including from contemporary art and artists. (GE 6)
- 3. Demonstrate an ability to use watercolor and gouache paint as a means to convey a creative visual idea.
- 4. Demonstrate through their paintings the ability to utilize various watercolor painting techniques and range of materials
