# **II. Catalog Description**

Prerequisites: Keyboard Skills 1 (MUSC 121) or permission of instructor. This course is a continuation of Keyboard Skills I, advancing the skills of keyboard playing, music reading and theory, keyboard techniques and appropriate repertory.

#### III. Statement of Course Need

A. Keyboard Skills courses are an essential part of the music curriculum, for students pursuing either the musical arts or music education. This course permits students to gain the basic keyboard skills required for further serious music study. The course is designed for the music student with a limited background in keyboard playing or those whose musical performance area is not the keyboard. It is the second course in a four semester sequence of keyboard skills, required for music majors as an adjunct to their studies in music theory, musicianship, MIDI and/or composition. The course is also appropriate for those interested in Early Childhood Education and in Music Therapy.

Keyboard Skills courses are standard offerings in community colleges and four-year institutions as they are also often desired by many community individuals for personal development and musical enrichment.

- B. This class is taught in A-23, our electronic keyboard lab, and is essentially the application of musical skills, knowledge, creativity and performance at the keyboard.
- C. Course transferability: Based on evaluations by the njtransfer.org website, this course transfers to most colleges as an Arts elective or a Free elective or as a keyboard proficiency course for music majors.

#### V. Outline of Course Content.

#### **Technical:**

- 1. Scales, 2 octaves, hands together, parallel motion:
- a. All Major scales, 2 octaves
- b. All minor harmonic scales
- 2. Major and minor arpeggios, Hands Together 2 octaves, beginning on all white keys.
- 3. Dominant Seventh Chords, Diminished Seventh Chords in all Major and minor keys, Hands Together, 2 octaves
- 4. Chord progression: I-IV-I-V-I in all Major and minor keys, hands together in block chords.

#### Harmonization:

L.H. accompaniments: block chords, broken chords, Alberti bass, waltz bass.

#### **Solo Repertoire:**

Required memorized one solo piece, one piece as an accompaniment to vocal or instrumental pieces.

#### Sight reading skills:

Bartok Mikrokosmos II: be able to transpose up and down a step or a third

- 1. develop the skills of keyboard playing (GE 1, 6, \*)
- 2. use the keyboard as a basic tool for the study of music theory, arranging, composing, digital applications and performance. (\*)
- 3. harmonize basic melodies with primary triads.
- 4. demonstrate accuracy and precision in the performance of technical exercises and solo and ensemble repertory.
- 5. transpose, harmonize, and sightread.
- 6. learn solo repertoire on the level of difficulty of Clementi Sonatina, Bach Anna Magdalena Book

The Keyboard Skills II Honors Option will be available for the students who have developed more advanced piano skills through KS I. The curriculum would be more rigorous and will require approximately 5 hours of practice per week. Through the class students will learn more pieces, more complicated exercises, harmonizations and scales.

### Honors Option Content:

- 1. Perform Major and Harmonic minor scales in all the keys in 4 octaves with correct fingering metronome marking quarter note=80
- 2. Prepare for the final exam two pieces of different styles and composers such as Beethoven: Ahn. 5 Sonatina in G Major, Bach: BWV Anh. 119 Polonaise in G Minor, Bartok: Sz. 53 Minuet
- 3. Hanon "Virtuoso Pianist" N 8-15 book I
