## **II. Catalog Description**

Audition/approval is required for RVCC Chamber Music I only. Each consecutive course becomes the prerequisite for the next level. This small ensemble course provides opportunity for the study and performance of chamber music literature in a wide variety of styles. Weekly

rehearsals and one or more public performances are required. For the music major, RVCC Chamber Music I, II, III and IV should be taken in sequence, and different repertory will be featured each semester. Students will improve their ensemble skills and their music reading ability. Other students (not music majors) may take Chamber Music on a credit or non-credit basis. Other interested community participants are welcome to join the RVCC Chamber Music on a non-credit, fee-paying basis through the Division of Corporate and Continuing Education.

#### III. Statement of Course Need

- A. The course is a standard offering of community colleges, four-year colleges and university music curricula, often open to student and community participants. Specifically, all collegiate music programs require their majors to participate in chamber groups during each semester of their enrollment. Chamber music as music composed for small ensembles, with one musician per part and generally performed without a conductor, will teach the students how to collaborate with other ensemble peers. During the semester of rehearsals and coachings, the students will learn how to collaborate and how to prepare for music performances as an ensemble. The RVCC Chamber Music will help to build a stronger connection with regional High Schools and community through involving them in the cultural life of the multi-county area.
- **B.** The course is considered a lab because it is a performance ensemble.
- C. Based on evaluations at the njtransfer.org website, the RVCC Chamber Music courses will transfer to most colleges and universities (including Rutgers University, William Paterson University, Kean University, Rowan University and The College of New Jersey) as the equivalent ensemble performance requirement in Associate or Bachelor music programs.

## **V. Outline of Course Content:**

- A. Courses will consist of college-level repertory from chamber music literature selected by the Coach.
- B. Repertory will vary each semester.
- C. Participants rehearse together weekly and will perform a public concert at the end of the semester.
- D. Other public performances may be given at on-campus or at off-campus venues.
