II. Catalog Description

Prerequisites: Student must be a native or heritage speaker and have appropriate placement score or permission of the instructor.

This course is designed for students for whom Spanish is a native or heritage language. It provides those students with the opportunity to expand their existing proficiency and to develop their reading and writing skills. Orthography, diacritics and vocabulary development are stressed. Emphasis will be placed on usage appropriate to academic and professional settings.

III. Statement of Course Need

- A. This course provides students with the opportunity to continue their study of Spanish and partially fulfills the language requirement in programs with a language requirement.
- B. Enrollment of native and heritage speakers of Spanish is increasing. The needs of these students are not always met in a "world language" class, which is, by definition, designed to teach Spanish to students for whom it is a world language.
- C. This course can transfer as the first semester of an intermediate Spanish language sequence.
