II. Catalog Description

Prerequisite: SPAN 202 – Intermediate Spanish Language and Culture II or placement test with writing sample.

Students will refine their speaking, listening, reading and writing skills in Spanish for use in social and professional situations. This course further develops advanced linguistic and cultural competence in Spanish, the second most utilized language in the United States after English. Speaking, listening, writing and reading are reinforced along with emphasis on current events, social issues, and cultural trends and norms in the Spanish-speaking world. Conducted in Spanish.

III. Statement of Course Need

- A. This course provides students with the opportunity to continue their study of Spanish and partially fulfills the language requirement in programs with a language requirement.
- B. This course transfers as a post-Intermediate Spanish II course in most Spanish programs.
- C. This course provides students with the opportunity to study the various cultures of the Spanish-speaking world.

IV. Place of Course in College Curriculum

- A. Free Elective
- B. This course serves as a General Education course in Humanities/World Language and Global and Cultural Awareness (pending).
- C. This course meets a program requirement for Liberal Arts (AA), Liberal Arts, Social Sciences (AA), Communication Studies (AA), English (AA) and is a program requirement option for Mathematics (AS).

V. Outline of Course Content

- A. A review of grammar to include, but not be limited to: the indicative, the preterit and imperfect, the subjunctive, "if" clauses and hypothetical expressions/situations, punctuation, and accents.
- B. Discussion of topics such as, but not limited to: independence, transportation, family values, gender roles and identity, immigration and politics, travel, sports, current events, popular culture, norms and trends in the Spanish-speaking world.
- C. Writing compositions that: narrate in the present, narrate in the past, persuade, explain, and describe.
- D. Culture
 - 1. Explore the cultures of Spanish-speaking countries around the world
 - 2. Discuss and explore the Hispanic culture of the United States
 - 3. Explore the dynamics of work, law, and politics
 - 4. Discuss and interpret recent global events using news outlets from the Spanish-speaking communities round the world
 - 5. Raise cultural understanding for language learning populations in both U.S. and Global environments

- 11. Write an argumentative or persuasive essay
- 12. Discuss current events in Spanish-speaking countries
- 13. Compare cultural/religious/social values across Hispanic culture/communities
- 14. Plan itineraries for travel to Spanish-speaking countries
