II. Catalog Description

Prerequisite: Acceptance into a Dual Enrollment Program or Course or Enrollment in an Early College Course. This course is an in-depth study in career and life planning designed for students accepted into specialized programs or courses seeking direction in college expectations, transitions, and setting life, academic and career goals. Credit will not be given for both STDV 103 (College Transitions) and STDV 100 (The College Experience).

III. Statement of Course Need

- **A.** This course fulfills a requirement for students in select academy programs or other college transition programs offered through RVCC and partnering high schools. This course examines transition issues faced by students during their transition to college, addressing the unique needs of students who are simultaneously pursuing a high school diploma and an Associate's degree. This course is an essential part of providing transition programs to students admitted to specialized programs and/or Early College students as they begin their college careers and establish long-term career development plans. Students will explore transition issues unique to students in specialized programs or Early College programs as well as develop a 10 year life plan.
- **B.** The course has no lab component
- **C.** This course may transfer as a free elective or similar course if offered.
