B. Contemporary drama

Discussion and performance of scenes from playwrights such as: August Wilson, Sam Shepard, John Patrick Shanley, Paula Vogel, David Mamet, or Tina Howe.

C. Classic drama

Discussion and performance of scenes from playwrights such as: Tennessee Williams, Eugene O'Neill, or Arthur Miller.

D. Theatre of the Absurd

Discussion and performance of scene from playwrights such as: Samuel Beckett, Eugene Ionesco, Edward Albee, or Harold Pinter.
