Acting III: Styles of Acting is a scene study course in which students perform scenes from different historical eras and styles including: ancient Greek tragedy, Commedia dell'Arte, Elizabethan and French classical.

Theatre majors considering transfer into a B.A. or B.F.A. program should experience the different styles of theatre and acting in order to be better prepared for the audition/interview into university or professional programs. The study of the Greek and Elizabethan performance styles is of particular importance. This course will be an elective for those in the A.A. Theatre program.

- B. Student will also be responsible for understanding the different historical eras and conventions in which the scenes were first performed.
