Our theme for this year's RVCC Foundation Annual Report is a fitting progression from last year's theme—provided by the Lumina Foundation, which declared: "It's time for community colleges to be the star of the college show." So, this year, as you'll see throughout this publication (and especially on pgs. 48-60), we are taking the stage, "asserting the RVCC voice"—and featuring some of the star power behind it.

There is good reason. RVCC has recovered from its pandemic-related enrollment loss. The College's new five-year strategic plan is being operationalized to ensure cohesion and vision guide future growth. RVCC is nationally recognized for its excellence in developing a service ethic in its students, and in its care for the environment and stewardship of its carbon footprint. The Workforce Training Center, fresh off a 22,000-square foot expansion, is blazing exciting new pathways in workforce training and expanding its ability to meet the demand of an ever-evolving workforce.

RVCC is also coming off a record fundraising year, crossing the \$2 million mark in funds raised for the first time in the College's 58-year history. In March, we had a record-breaking RVCC Giving Day—raising \$228,863 in a single 24-hour period, thanks to historic matching funds provided by three exceptional supporters of the College. That giving day total was the most ever for any community college in New Jersey, and included historic participation levels by students and alumni, indicative of a growing culture of philanthropy.

And with that Giving Day total came another distinction: surpassing \$1 million raised in the 10-year cumulative history of RVCC Giving Day. No other New Jersey community college—and only a handful in the U.S.—can make that claim.

In addition, we will soon announce the largest single gift ever received at RVCC. It will also be the largest single gift ever received by a New Jersey community college—and in the top ten largest ever for any community college in America.

The College's accomplishments belie a fundamental truth about Raritan Valley Community College: It is worth every dollar, every gift, every partnership, every collaboration, and every act of support, in any form. It is the best community college in New Jersey, and among the best in the country. Its faculty and staff are stars. Its students are rising stars. And all are worthy of being center stage.

Most of our supporters understand these assertions, but they de-

serve to be stated, amplified, and celebrated. Indeed, RVCC has earned its starring role in the college show, on the higher education stage.

But we also know that some of our readers and supporters may not have ever stepped foot on campus or met any of the people who make it exceptional. Which is why we always use this Annual Report as a showcase—for the accomplishments and the voices of our students, faculty, and staff.

My own RVCC voice was preceded by 11 years at Rutgers University. Everything I was seeking in my transition from "The State University," I found at RVCC. Community. Friendship. Leadership. The power of true connections. The virtues of small. After experiencing the immensity of Rutgers, I especially appreciated the smallness, the intimacy that RVCC offered.

In fact, my eight years at Raritan Valley Community College have been among the best of my professional life. And it seems my trajectory has always been pointed toward small: From a global corporate communications giant (AT&T) with operations around the planet, to a major R1 University with sprawling campuses across the State, to a single community college in Branchburg, New Jersey.

The truth is, I am proud of this College and the leadership behind its success. I am proud of RVCC's stature on New Jersey's higher education landscape. I am proud of our gritty determination to persevere despite every obstacle we face. I am proud of our ability to innovate, take risks, and find solutions when they're rarely obvious. I am proud of every student who chooses to attend RVCC—and especially those who enliven the campus with their passion and energy.

I am grateful to be part of a passionate, enriching community and to lead such a creative, resourceful, and talented RVCC Foundation team. As I reflect on my four and a half decades of work in the public and private sectors, across a range of organizations, initiatives, and causes, I will always cherish that the capstone of my career was spent at RVCC.

But I reserve my deepest gratitude for all of the people and organizations who've said "yes" to Raritan Valley Community College over the years. To those who've invested, given generous gifts, partnered, collaborated, or otherwise applauded the star power of RVCC. We are proud to have you with us, as you, too, are stars of the college show.

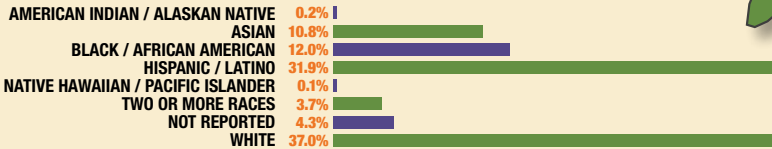

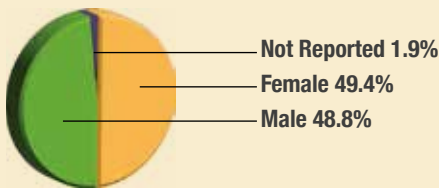

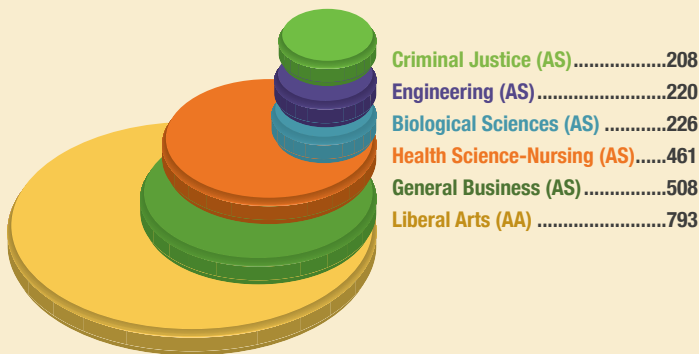

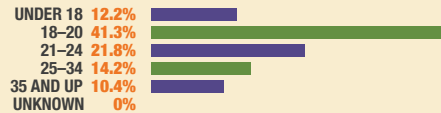
STUDENT GENDER



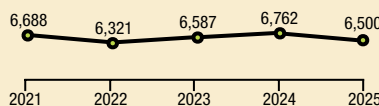
POPULAR MAJORS



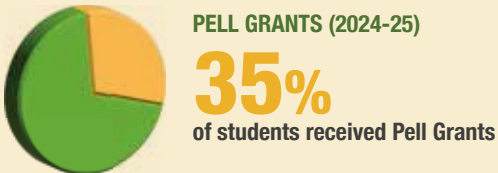
STUDENT AGE



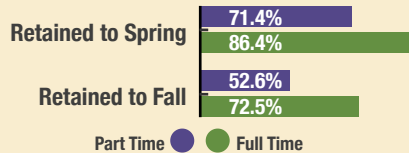
FIVE YEAR TREND (HEADCOUNT)

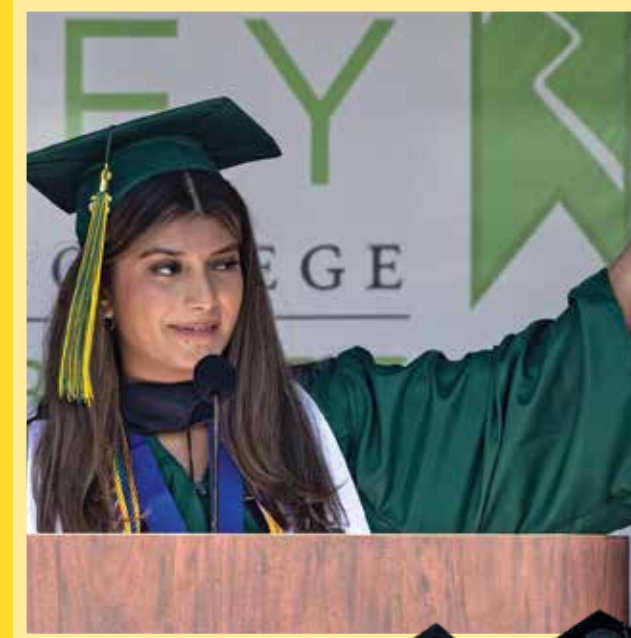
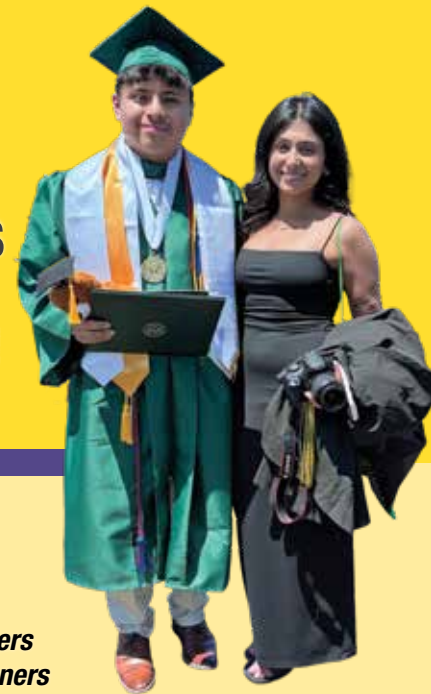

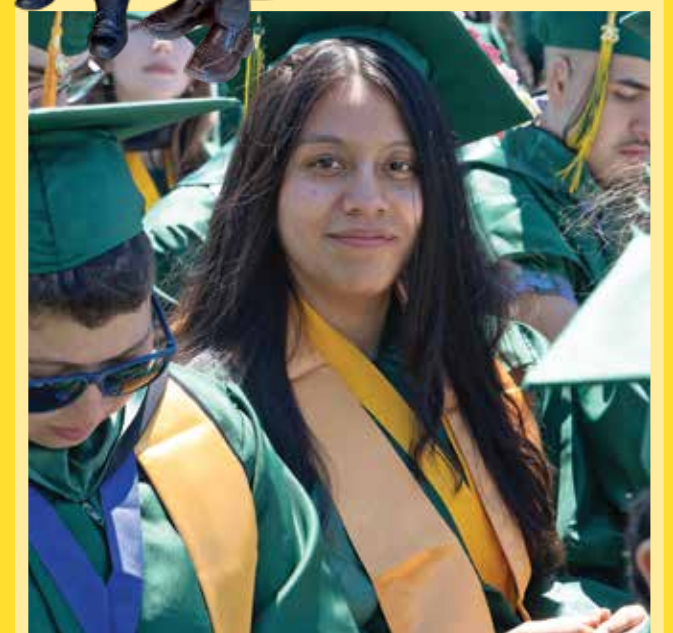

RVCC FOUNDATION GOLF CLASSIC RAISES OVER \$153,000



The RVCC Foundation raised \$153,185 at the 21st Annual RVCC Foundation Golf Classic, held June 9, 2025 at the Neshanic Valley Golf Course.

This event was another sellout, with 147 participants, including enthusiastic golfers representing a wide range of local businesses from throughout Hunterdon and Somerset counties and beyond. Corporate sponsors were headlined by “Title Sponsor,” LJS Electric. In addition to the golf sponsors, the event met its goal by raising \$7,500 for a special “ONE FULL RIDE” new initiative, which will provide one “Full Ride” scholarship for a student to attend Raritan Valley Community College.

LOCAL CHILDREN PARTICIPATE IN “LITTLE SCIENTISTS NIGHT” AT RVCC

Local children were offered the opportunity to dive into fun, hands-on science activities during last fall’s “Little Scientists Night” in the College’s Christine Todd Whitman Science Center.



RVCC’s Department of Science and Engineering partnered with the Pioneer Family Success Center to welcome over 150 guests, about half of whom were children from toddlers to age 12, proudly wearing their lab coats. The program was led by RVCC faculty and staff, close to 100 RVCC student volunteers, and members from 12 of the College’s STEM clubs. The RVCC students helped with logistics and ran 35 engaging STEM activities, spanning astronomy, biology, chemistry, engineering, environmental science, physics, and more.

The Science Center was filled with creative activity stations, excited families, and RVCC students showing off their energy and talent as they guided the “Little Scientists” through each experiment.

STUDENT NURSES’ ASSOCIATION OFFERS SERVICE TO COLLEGE, COMMUNITY



The Student Nurses’ Association (SNA) wrapped up the fall semester by delivering Holiday Wish gifts to 10 teenagers at Agape House. The SNA also sponsored cookie and ornament decorating activities, as well as a holiday coloring activity, with younger residents of Agape House. Based in Somerset County, Agape House offers emergency housing and case management services to single adults and families with children.

SNA service projects during the fall semester also included promoting two on-campus Blood Drives and monitoring blood donors during the event; providing blood pressure checks and stroke education at the College’s Employee Benefits Fair; sponsoring a Nursing Jacket Fundraiser to benefit Hurricane Melissa Relief in Jamaica; and publicizing an ongoing Food Drive for the RVCC Resource Center and Food Pantry.

HUNTERDON CENTRAL AND RVCC JOIN TOGETHER FOR SPECIAL PARTNERSHIP



Hunterdon Central Regional High School and RVCC have joined together to create a special dual enrollment partnership for students who enroll in the high school’s Biomedical Science Academy through its Magnet Program. Starting with the incoming Class of 2030, students taking the Biomedical Science Magnet Academy courses can earn up to 33 college credits while attending Hunterdon Central. Following their high school graduation, students can then matriculate to RVCC and complete the Associate of Science degree in Health Science in as little as one year. “Raritan Valley Community College’s expanded partnership with Hunterdon Central Regional High School is a wonderful example of the College’s ongoing commitment to expanding access to students and helping them reduce their higher education costs,” said Shay Wadher, Director of K-12 Partnerships, Raritan Valley Community College. Students follow a guided course sequence to complete the Biomedical Science Magnet Academy, with all of the courses approved by RVCC to earn college credit. Credits from RVCC transfer to state colleges and universities as well as many others across the country and even abroad. Students finishing the Associate of Science degree also have a leg up on transferring to the four-year college or university of

their choice to pursue a bachelor’s degree. “This exciting expansion of our partnership with RVCC offers students a unique bridge to their future: they can dive deep into subjects they love, such as biomedical sciences, and experience college-level rigor with the safety net of high school support. This new program also offers families significant savings on tuition,” said Dr. Matthew Hall, Director of Curriculum and Instruction, Hunterdon Central Regional High School District. The biomedical science courses offered at Hunterdon Central and continuing at RVCC provide students with an in-depth understanding of health science and that industry, giving them increased career readiness upon their college graduation. “The collaboration between RVCC and Hunterdon Central strengthens the talent pipeline for students interested in pursuing education and training in healthcare and health-related fields. This initiative builds on the strong programs within both institutions and helps increase access and opportunity for Hunterdon Central students. The partnership will help students graduate with confidence and momentum toward future study. It also demonstrates a shared commitment between Hunterdon Central Regional High School and RVCC to invest in the next generation of health professionals,” said Dr. Drue Stapleton, RVCC Dean of Health Sciences.

ESTHETICS STUDENT RECEIVES SCHOLARSHIP



Fatima Akbar Rizvi of Bridgewater, a fulltime student in RVCC’s Esthetics (skincare) program, received the Fall 2025 “Hydrafacial Glow Getter Scholarship.” The \$5,000 scholarship, administered by Beauty Changes Lives, is designed to empower women who want to establish a career in esthetics. It offers financial support

for those in an Esthetics program that leads to licensure or certification, or for currently licensed professionals interested in elevating their skills. Rizvi, who has been a bridal professional makeup artist for approximately nine years, hopes to work as a medical esthetician for a dermatologist. Her future goal, she says, is to have her own medical spa business.

RVCC Adjunct Faculty member Dr. Anita Petersen and Manville Public Schools have been honored by the National Association of Community College Teacher Education Programs (NACCTEP) for their efforts to prepare future educators.

Manville Public Schools has received the NACCTEP 2026 Partner Award, and Dr. Petersen, an Adjunct Associate Professor in the College's Humanities, Social Sciences, Social Work & Education department, is a recipient of the NACCTEP 2026 Adjunct Faculty Award.

The honors were given at the National Association of Community College Teacher Education Programs' annual

pre-conference event, "Community College Teacher Education Research, Policy, and Practice," held this past winter in New Orleans. The event is held ahead of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education's annual meeting.

Dr. Petersen, who was celebrated as an exemplary adjunct faculty member in RVCC's Education programs, is being recognized for her dedication to her students and her commitment to faculty support of future teachers. An instructor at RVCC for 20 years, Dr. Petersen has taught Early Childhood and Education courses in various certificate and degree programs. She also has served as temporary leave replacements for the program's fulltime faculty members.

"This is a well-deserved honor for Anita. She is creative and supportive of her students and is responsive and innovative with her colleagues at RVCC," said Dr. Kathryn Suk, RVCC Professor of Education and Education Program Coordinator.

Manville Public Schools was recognized as an exemplary community partner with the College's Education Programs and for the P-12 district's longstanding commitment to hosting RVCC student observers. "Students interested in becoming preschool through high school teachers have been welcomed into classrooms throughout the district for nearly 10 years," Dr. Suk continued.

STUDENTS, ALUMNI VOLUNTEER AS TOUR GUIDES FOR EXHIBITION



RVCC students Justine Markos-Saad, Ella Partanna, Jaimy Solis, Nabeeha Khan, Amelia Reitman, Chris Fox, and Shanya Saunders, along with RVCC alumni Lev Baab and Ashley Reyes, volunteered their time and talents as trained tour guides this past winter and spring for the traveling exhibition, Anne Frank: A History for Today.

Presented by the College's Institute of Holocaust and Genocide Studies, Anne Frank: A History for Today was on display in the Morris and Dorothy Hirsch

Research Library, located on the second floor of the Evelyn S Field Library. The student training and service learning component of the initiative was supported by The Pray Family Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement at RVCC.

After completing a two-day civic leadership training led by professional educators from the Anne Frank Center—the official national partner of the Anne Frank House in Amsterdam, where the exhibition was created—the students began guiding visitors through the powerful exhibition. The training prepared participants to facilitate meaningful dialogue, provide historical context, and connect Anne Frank's story to contemporary issues of prejudice, discrimination, and civic responsibility.

The exhibition was open to the public, and tours were offered to RVCC English classes, local middle school students, and senior citizen groups.

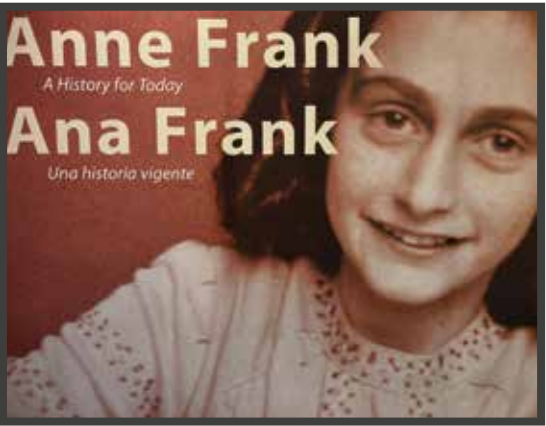
Anne Frank: A History for Today presents the history of the Holocaust as told

through the perspective of Anne Frank and her family. The display features 11 large panels, as well as artifacts. Juxtaposing photographs of the Frank family with historical images, the exhibit shows how persecuted people were affected by the political actions of individuals and groups.

"Through their service, the student volunteers earned service learning credit, developed public speaking and leadership skills, and contributed valuable community engagement hours," said Lori Moog, Director of Service Learning and Community Outreach. "Their participation reflects the Pray Family Center's commitment to fostering civic responsibility and meaningful community involvement among our students."

"The dedication of our student volunteers demonstrates the power of education to inspire leadership and purposeful community engagement," said Michelle Edgar, Program Specialist for the Institute of Holocaust and Genocide Studies. "By guiding this exhibit, they are helping to ensure that Anne Frank's story continues to educate and inspire new generations."

The Institute of Holocaust & Genocide Studies at Raritan Valley Community College is a collaboration with the Jewish Federation of West-Central New Jersey. The exhibition was also supported by the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education.

RVCC EARNs NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR NONPARTISAN VOTER ENGAGEMENT



colleges and universities for developing innovative and effective strategies to increase nonpartisan civic engagement and student voter participation.

RVCC is one of 129 campuses nationwide—and only 19 community colleges—recognized for the 2026 election cycle. RVCC is one of only two New Jersey community colleges to earn the Highly Established Action Plan Seal, the program’s highest level of recognition for institutional planning and impact.

The College’s initiative was led by The Pray Family Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement, in partnership with the Office of Student Life. RVCC’s Action Plan focuses on engaging students, faculty, administrators, community nonprofit partners, and local election officials in collaborative efforts to increase student voter participation.

Through both curricular and co-curricular initiatives—inside and outside the classroom—the College promotes informed civic participation. Activities have included voter registration drives, opportunities for students to train and serve as poll workers, civic education workshops, election information sessions,

RVCC has been awarded the 2026 Highly Established Action Plan Seal by the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge. The national initiative recognizes

and social media campaigns designed to encourage students to register, learn about key issues, and vote.

The ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge—in collaboration with the American Democracy Project, Campus Vote Project, NASPA LEAD Initiative, and the Students Learn Students Vote Coalition—developed the Strengthening American Democracy Guide to help campuses create comprehensive action plans that promote democratic engagement. Institutions evaluate their plans using a rubric based on the guide; the Highly Established Action Plan Seal recognizes campuses that score at least 31.5 out of 36 possible points.

The ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge currently engages more than 9.8 million students at over 960 institutions across all 50 states and the District of Columbia, helping colleges and universities institutionalize nonpartisan civic learning and voter participation.

After placing in the Eastern Regional Conference, the RVCC students qualified for the NATS National Student Auditions.

RVCC’s AFA in Music prepares students to transfer into Bachelor’s Degree programs in Music at four-year colleges and universities. The RVCC degree features two tracks: Applied Music and Music Production. The Applied Music track is designed for students interested in pursuing careers in Performance, Music Education, or Music Therapy, while the Music Production track is for students who wish to pursue careers in Audio Engineering, Music Production, and related fields.

SISTERS IN STEM CLUB PARTNERS WITH FRANKLIN MIDDLE SCHOOL



RVCC’s Sister in STEM (SIS) club offered local middle school students the opportunity to learn about science and engineering in a fun and engaging way. The eight SIS members partnered with Franklin Middle School to host 25 girls for a STEM Day this past spring, offering hands-on activities for the budding scientists. The SIS members guided and supported the students throughout the event, leading the activities and serving as encouraging role models.

In the first activity, students worked together to build simple LED circuits using batteries and wires. Engaging in the effort helped them learn basic electrical engineering concepts while creating a working project. Later, they explored Tangrams—puzzles made of seven shapes that can be

arranged into different designs. This activity encouraged them to learn about geometry as they practiced problem-solving and used critical thinking skills.

Reflecting on the STEM Day’s experience, club advisor Dr. Antonella Pompo, RVCC Professor of Engineering, said, “The SIS members did a great job creating a welcoming and supportive environment. Their leadership and mentorship made the experience both educational and inspiring. The event truly highlights RVCC’s commitment to community outreach and to encouraging young women to explore STEM fields.”



RVCC HOSTS 2026 NJ INTEGRAL BEE FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

RVCC's Math Club hosted the 2026 NJ Integral Bee, an exciting and intellectually rigorous mathematics competition for high school students. The event, held this past spring at the College's Christine Todd Whitman Science Center, was led by a dedicated cohort from Bridgewater-Raritan High School's Mu Alpha Theta Math Honors Society Chapter.

The program brought together some of New Jersey's most talented high school

mathematicians for an evening of challenging problem-solving and collaboration. Eighteen high school students competed in the three-hour competition, tackling over 100 integrals drawn from Calculus I and II classes. The event was entirely led and emceed by high school students, while a panel of four RVCC Mathematics and Computer Science professors served as judges, ensuring a fair and academically rigorous evaluation of all participants.

The event was made possible through strong campus collaboration. Members of the RVCC Rotaract Club volunteered their time to assist with event logistics, helping ensure a smooth and welcoming experience for all participants. In addition, RVCC engineering student Joseph Angline showcased an impressive collection of over 20, 3D-printed models inspired by SpaceX and NASA, adding an engaging and educational visual component to the evening.

After this summer, we'll be celebrating another milestone at Raritan Valley Community College. The opening of the new "Center for Community Education and Engagement" will provide expanded space for The Achievement Center (TAC) at Raritan Valley Community College. This innovative program provides college access for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

TAC, which is celebrating its 10th anniversary this year, was inspired by a conversation between RVCC President Michael McDonough and the mother of a student with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Her observation: "it's not fair that my child doesn't have the opportunity to experience college." The president agreed. Then he pushed ahead an idea, and a collaboration between Raritan Valley Community College, the Arc of Somerset County, and The Arc of Hunterdon County was born.

And what started 10 years ago with two students and two classes, now has 55 classes and 187 students, across all of the TAC programs, including the popular "Club Friday Night Hangout." TAC at RVCC will provide college access to more

than 200 students by next fall, with some 68 TAC students taking RVCC-credit courses. In short, it is an exceptional example of what an "open access" institution enables.

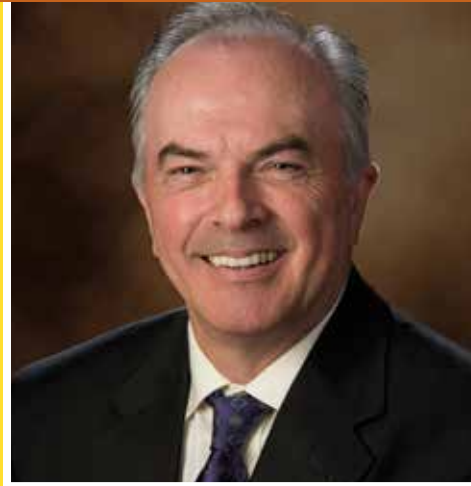
But there's more to this story. Also unique to the 10-year journey of The Achievement Center at Raritan Valley Community College: the "first ever" scholarships for TAC students, an historic multi-year commitment from The Provident Bank Foundation—through the leadership of Samantha Plotino—to expand STEM offerings, and most recently, the birth of an alumni association for TAC grads.

Flash forward to last fall's "Student Involvement Fair" at the Raritan Valley Community College Event Center, which was buzzing with energy and exuberance. More than 30 student clubs and organizations proudly displayed their work, missions, and goals.

One group of four students, positioned front and center in the lobby, welcomed visitors with their own narrative of success, pride, and big aspirations. In short: college experience realized, and achievement attained.



RVCC PRESIDENT NAMED TO NJBIZ 2025 EDUCATION POWER LIST



RVCC President Dr. Michael J. McDonough has been selected as part of NJBIZ's 2025 Education Power List. The recognition of McDonough, who took over as president at Raritan Valley Community College in 2014, is in acknowledgment of the many accomplishments he has helped achieve. Today, RVCC enrolls approximately 6,500 students, a total McDonough has helped build

steadily through aggressive marketing and outreach after the impacts of the pandemic.

This year, the school adopted a new, five-year strategic plan, "Leading Change, Inspiring Possibility." Commenting on the outline, McDonough noted colleges must not only accept change but embrace it amid an evolving learning landscape.

In February, RVCC was an integral part of the launch of NJBioFutures, a public-private workforce development partnership that will serve the state's expanding cell and gene therapy sector—to which Johnson & Johnson contributed \$1 million as founding sponsor. RVCC is also a leader in the area of operational sustainability, recognized at both the national and state levels for its stellar environmental practices. For the 2025 fiscal year, the RVCC Foundation also set a new fundraising record, surpassing the \$2 million mark for the first time in the College's history. McDonough is also active in the community college sector, serving as chair of the Executive Committee of the New Jersey Community College Consortium for Workforce and Economic Development, and chair of the Academic Issues Committee; he is a board member for Engage NJ.

NEW STRATEGIC PLAN FOR RVCC

With approval from the RVCC Board of Trustees, the College has launched a new strategic plan, "2025-2030 Strategic Plan: Leading Change, Inspiring Possibility," focusing on six themes: Student Success & Academic Excellence; Workforce & Economic Development; Access & Affordability; Community Engagement & Partnership; Infrastructure, Technology & Environmental Stewardship; and Institutional Culture.

"As many students move away from traditional academic pathways and require additional support systems and essential career skills—while conventional funding sources decline—it's vital the College not only accepts change, but also embraces it. Raritan Valley Community College's new Strategic Plan focuses on our commitment to student

success through the enhancement of academic, community, and corporate partnerships; an investment in resources to keep pace with a changing workforce; and an obligation to deliver an affordable, accessible education to help transform our inspiring students' lives," said RVCC President Michael J. McDonough.

In fall 2024, a Strategic Planning Committee was formed representing all constituencies of the RVCC community, including students and the Board of Trustees. The committee then hosted numerous focus groups and requested electronic survey feedback to discover relevant themes that represent the College's collective goals for the future. Presentations were then made to the College community and at Board of Trustees Strategy and Vision Committee meetings throughout the spring 2025 semester, in conjunction with the Strategic Planning Committee's biweekly gatherings, to develop plan details based on constituent comments and to provide updates. Additional feedback was collected during and after each presentation, resulting in the final Strategic Plan presented and approved in May 2025.



35th ANNUAL ROBESON AWARDS



Middle and high school students from Somerset and Hunterdon counties were honored for their achievements at the 35th Annual Paul Robeson Youth Achievement Awards, held April 20 at Raritan Valley Community College. The event, attended by 270 people, was sponsored by the College's Paul Robeson Institute for Ethics, Leadership and Social Justice.

Approximately 75 students were nominated for awards by their school counselors, teachers, and administrators. A special committee of RVCC faculty and staff members selected the 20 award recipients. The evening featured a keynote address by Ka'Sheer Cassett, alumnus of RVCC and Howard University (Magna Cum Laude), and current

employee of Sanofi.

The National Council of Negro Women and RVCC initiated the Paul Robeson Youth Achievement Awards program to pay tribute to the outstanding attainments of students in Somerset and Hunterdon counties. The awards are named in honor of Paul Robeson, a Princeton native who grew up in Somerville and graduated from Somerville High School and Rutgers University. The awards are given in four areas in which Robeson excelled: Scholarship, the Arts, Community Service and Athletics, as well as special "Renaissance Awards" given to students who excel in a number of disciplines.

The Evelyn Field Visionary Award also was presented at the ceremony. The award pays tribute to the founding member of the RVCC Board of Trustees, who was a dynamic and compassionate advocate for promoting diversity and equality on campus. In 1990 Evelyn Field established the Paul Robeson Youth Achievement Program to preserve Paul Robeson's legacy as a role model for excellence.

The Paul Robeson Institute for Ethics, Leadership and Social Justice was founded in 1999 to preserve Paul Robeson's legacy in the area where he came of age as an artist, athlete, orator, and scholar. The Institute envisions a global community of diverse cultures that embodies, through attitudes and behaviors, Paul Robeson's ideals, beliefs, values and vision for a world of justice and peace.

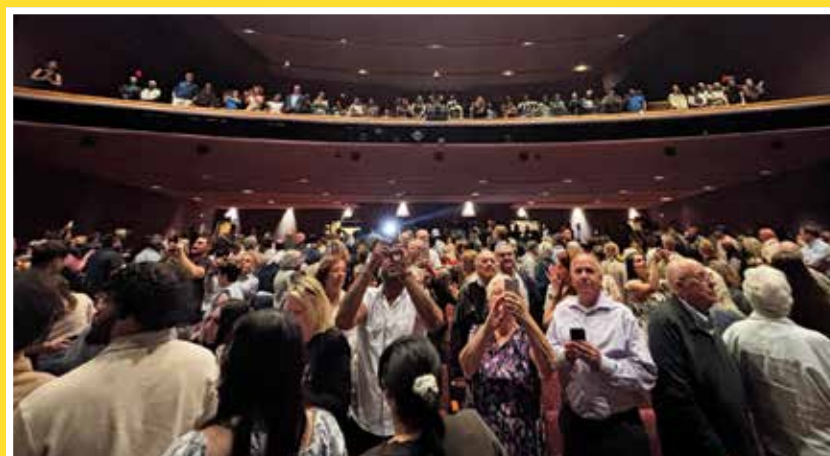

While RVCC GIVING DAY 2026 is officially over, we are still celebrating the historic fundraising total—\$228,863—and the 848 gifts that drove this 24-hour fundraiser for Raritan Valley Community College.

We are celebrating our supremely generous benefactors behind this year’s \$75,000 “Match Challenge”—to Jim and Jill Gibson, Don and Penny Pray, and our

anonymous donor, our gratitude is deep, as your support inspired our historic results.

We are celebrating our students—clubs and athletic teams—for setting new high-water marks of fundraising success: a 56% increase in funds raised, a nearly 20% increase in the number of students personally giving, and record number—39—of clubs and athletic teams participating this year.

There are countless expressions of generosity, similarly heartfelt, but each unique to individual expression. As a group, now over a decade strong, and numbering over a hundred, they are linked by the extraordinary generosity of Jim and Jill Gibson.

And while it's easy to toss around "transformative" and "difference making" when describing the impacts of philanthropy, it's quite another when the source is those who've been impacted.

The Gibson name stands out in the philanthropic landscape at RVCC. Their generosity spans 16 years and is far ranging at the College, and includes their support of Galileo Scholarships, the Gibson Family Endowed Scholarship, RVCC Giving Day (helping fuel the annual "match challenge"), and the Center for Environmental Studies. The Gibson name has real consequence at RVCC; it carries a distinction of honor, prestige. The name is also visible in a few places on campus (e.g., the Gibson Center for Innovation in Science & Technology, The Gibson Greenhouse)—but this exposure



is not at their insistence. Instead, it's a gesture of deep appreciation by leadership at RVCC in recognition of impact realized.

The Gibsons' latest commitment, a five-year, \$500,000 gift to support the Center for Environmental Studies, adds great depth to what is already an epic legacy. The Center

for Environmental Studies will use the funding associated with this gift to sustain student engagement—30-50 paid student internships each year—in these critical areas of interest: Forest Ecology, Wildlife Research, Coastal Conservation & Rare Plant Research and Recovery, Open Space Stewardship and Native Plant Propagation, Water Quality Research, and Campus Sustainability & Outreach. Imagine the real-world experiences for students in professional environmental research, conservation and restoration, in service to local community partners and natural resources—all provided through the generosity of the Gibsons.

Among the things on the itinerary ahead: diversifying and expanding uses of the Gibson Greenhouse by partnering with other organizations (both within the College and in the community), including the RVCC Food Pantry, Somerset County Parks, and Branchburg Community Garden, among others. The Center's leadership will also continue to work with students to develop scientific presentations describing the results of their work to present

at local and regional conferences. Partnering with local environmental organizations to monitor water quality in rivers, streams, lakes, and reservoirs around central New Jersey will also continue at full speed. Over the past five years, this work has included collaborating with: the Raritan Headwaters and the NJ Water Supply Authority to study harmful algal blooms in Spruce Run, Budd Lake, and downstream locations; the Sourland Conservancy to compare water quality in watersheds with primary versus post-agricultural forests; and the Raritan Headwaters, to continuously monitor a range of water quality parameters in 13 stream locations over six years.

In addition, participation with the New Jersey School of Conservation in Stokes State Forest, the Pine Tree Center and Pinelands Research Institute near Wharton State Forest, will continue, providing students with enriching



outdoor experiences, skills and interpretive programs, as well as team-building and cohort development—all of which contribute to their increased academic, professional, and personal growth.

“The generosity of the Gibsons has been

an absolutely crucial piece in facilitating the Center’s internship programs. We simply could not pay stipends to our student interns without their support,” said Emilie Stander, Co-Director of the Center for Environmental Studies. “And we know many of our students are ready to put their classroom learning to good use working on real-world, local environmental issues

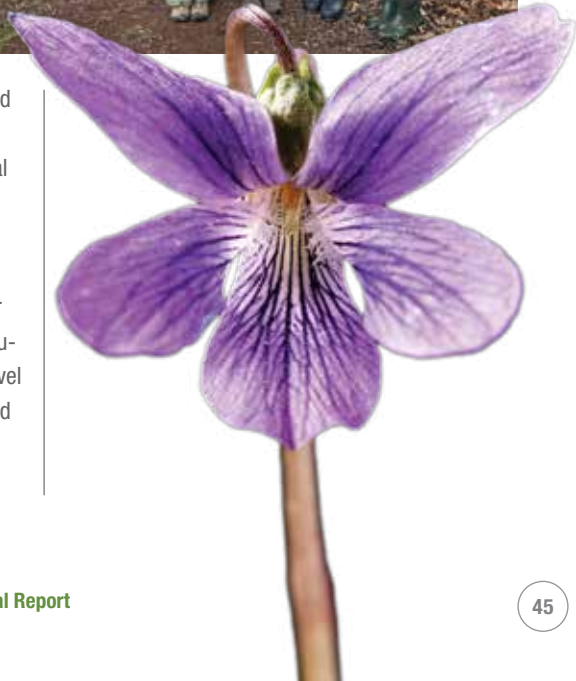

and that their work can make a meaningful contribution to studying and addressing these issues. Fortunately for us, the Gibsons know this too, and with their support, we can make these enriching opportunities available to our students.” Professor Stander relishes the trajectories of the Center’s former interns as they go on to earn their bachelor’s degrees and land positions at the Department of Environmental Protection and at area environmental non-profits and consulting firms. “They effectively become our

colleagues in the environmental space,” noted Professor Stander. “How exceptional is that? And the Gibsons’ generosity has been integral to that transformation.” What is also incredible about the educational experiences enabled by the Gibsons’ support is how exceptionally rare they are for “freshmen” and “sophomores” at any community college, anywhere in the country. That level of exceptionalism—and the generosity behind it—is truly in a class of its own.

Dr. Emilie Stander
Professor, Environmental Science
Time with RVCC: 13 years

One of the great things about being a college-level professor is the freedom I have in my day-to-day work. No one micromanages the way I manage my classroom, my interactions with students, and my time. Of course, because I am a professional and am devoted to my work, I am constantly evolving in my teaching and practice with students. I attend conferences, webinars, and workshops to learn about high-impact teaching practices and do my best to incorporate these into my courses. In doing so, I have the freedom to draw on my creativity and professional expertise to design meaningful experiences for students inside and outside the classroom.

I find this to be a constant well of inspiration and renewal that keeps me engaged and motivated in my work.

RVCC has been an incredibly supportive partner in these pursuits. As a professor of environmental science who manages the environmental studies and science degree programs, one of my goals is to help environmental majors prepare for careers in the environmental field. Professionals from RVCC's Office of Career Success have visited my environmental capstone course to facilitate interactive workshops for students on resume preparation, personal branding, and networking. Our career professionals have also coached my students in developing a professional eportfolio that they can share with potential transfer schools and employers. Students use their eportfolio to reflect on the technical and career-related skills they are developing through their academic coursework, which helps them prepare for those dreaded job interview questions about their strengths and weaknesses.

It's also critical that environmental majors develop an ethic of community service to be successful in the environmental world. I have successfully partnered with RVCC's Office of Service Learning to connect with local environmental organizations so that students can engage in hands-on learning which also

benefits the local community. Activities have included stream assessments, rain garden maintenance, community clean ups, and more. With funding from exceptional donors through the RVCC Foundation, my colleague Jay Kelly and I have created the RVCC Center for Environmental Studies. Through the center, we hire paid student interns to assist us in conducting environmental monitoring, research, and stewardship on campus and in the community.

We collaborate with state and local government and environmental non-profit organizations in this work to study and address local environmental issues related to forest and stream health and conserving threatened plant and animal species. Through their internships students develop both technical and career-related skills, like communication, collaboration, and leadership, which build their confidence and propel them through the rest of their academic journey and into the professional working world.

RVCC has been an invaluable and ideal partner in this work. The college has provided the enabling environment that has allowed me to create authentic and meaningful experiences for students both in and out of the classroom. It has given me the space to conduct research and use campus as a living lab for studying and addressing real-world environmental issues. Students who have

participated in this work reflect on the impact these experiences have had on them, both professionally and personally.

After they transfer to four-year schools, they regularly reach out to Jay and me to express their gratitude for having had these opportunities far earlier in their college careers than their four-year counterparts. It's endlessly rewarding for us to see our students grow in their confidence and ability in the short time we have with them. For those who stay local, we get to watch them enter into environmental roles in county and state government, non-profits, and consulting firms, and often we get to work with them as peers and collaborators. RVCC provides the foundation; my students and I get to run with it.



Alexa Offenhauer, PhD
Associate Professor of English
Time with RVCC: 17 years

There are so many ways that RVCC has had a positive impact on my life. As a kid in Hunterdon County, I had field trips to RVCC. I'll never forget the time we went to the theater to hear a Holocaust survivor talk about her life and experiences. I was in seventh grade at the time and just learning to understand the world, and that was a formative moment.

As an adult, I had left the area and gotten a master's degree with a plan to teach high school. But life or fate intervened and I ended up becoming a part-time English professor at RVCC in 2009. I immediately loved the job, the students, and the community. Eventually, I applied for and received a full-time faculty position in the English department. Over the years, I have seen students from all backgrounds,

interests, and talents thrive at RV, where there are so many options and outlets for creativity, intellectual pursuits, career training, and more.

More recently, my own daughter enrolled at RVCC, and I learned how amazing it is from the perspective of a parent. As with so many of our students, she was non-traditional, being a teenager still completing high school. For a variety of reasons—the same sorts that bring many of our students to our doors—the traditional path wasn't working for her. So, she earned 30 credits at RVCC and with it, her high school diploma. While here, she was elected Student Government Senator, helped organize events, and even initiated a revision to the reporting process for campus incidents. Throughout, she was supported and encouraged by faculty, staff, and administrators. She will be attending Smith College this fall, and I am certain she was accepted in very large part due to her experiences and opportunities at RVCC.

But my daughter is only one type of student—academically confident and highly motivated from the beginning—who is well-served by RVCC. Some of the students in my classes are in a similar position, but many arrive with less confidence and even huge uncertainty about whether they are “college material.” I love working with these students, who soon learn that they are academically capable. I see them grow in independence, confidence, and skill while they are here.

There's simply no better institution for serving such an incredibly wide variety of students, whose varied needs, interests, and talents are met and honed by faculty, staff, and administrators who believe in the mission of a community college: open access, affordable, relevant education that holds students to the highest standards while providing them with the support they need to meet those standards. I can't think of a better place to develop, grow, and thrive than Raritan Valley Community College.



Amie Gallagher
Director, RVCC Planetarium
Time with RVCC: 29 years

I remember my first visit to a planetarium. I was about 8 years old. I don't remember the show we saw, but I remember walking down the dark hallway into a magical room. While some details may have slipped away, the awe has always remained. It started me on a long and winding path that led me to RVCC.

I am honored to be the director of our College's planetarium. I have been associated with it since 1997 when I helped launch a state-wide program connecting classroom teachers with astronomers who would come into schools and do hands-on activities with the students. While that project has concluded, I smoothly transitioned into working with students and teachers in our planetarium on campus. Today, the RVCC Planetarium hosts more than 15,000 visitors throughout the year for our planetarium shows, laser concerts, and at the telescopes in our observatory.

I like to think of the Planetarium as the “community” in “community college.” We are one of many ways RVCC reaches out and embraces the greater community around us. The Planetarium is often the first visit a child makes to our campus. Their excitement as they walk through our doors is contagious. I observe each child and wonder, which of these young people will grow up to be an astronaut, engineer, science communicator, or teacher, who will go on to inspire more people to learn about and connect with the sky and our Universe. Perhaps it will begin with their visit to the RVCC Planetarium.

RVCC supports their staff in ways some of

my professional colleagues envy. RVCC allows for creativity and innovative ideas. We are not tied to one method of interacting with our visitors. New programs are constantly being explored and encouraged in our Planetarium. We have created sensory-friendly programs and guided meditation programs. We open our observatory each week to observe and take pictures of the sky. We've created hands-on activities that coordinate with different show themes. We work with other departments on campus to provide a unique teaching and presentation space. We've even hosted marriage proposals and rock bands, though not at the same time.

I am delighted to continue to inspire awe in my visitors, young and older. I love when someone walks out of our theater and says, “wow, that was incredible!” I feel the same way.

Celeste Onka
First Student Accepted at Somerset County College (now Raritan Valley Community College), September 1968

It was difficult to try to make a decision on which college to attend when I was graduating

in June 1968 from Somerville High School. Interestingly, an advertisement began appearing in the Courier News about a new college called, Somerset County College. Several courses were being offered but the one that really meant something important to my career plans was the Computer Science degree. The advertisement indicated that the length of time for this credential was only two years.

When I started at the College, there were so many things that the students could help establish—and we worked a lot with all of the professors and instructors. The women attending the College helped start a cheerleader team and even selected the design of the cheerleaders' outfits. In addition, the College started men's basketball and baseball competitions with other colleges, and the women started a volleyball team.

Amazingly, the instructors at the College were always so helpful and willing to meet and discuss any of the learning challenges; and they really helped us develop as learner—prepare for graduation. I was so lucky to be in the Computer Science program and the instructor, Professor Irving Horowitz, also hired me to be his secretary to help create many things for all of the new students who chose Somerset County College.

It was so wonderful to have been an attendee for the first two years of the College. The initial classes were actually held at Green Brook High School but a property was starting to develop in Branchburg, NJ where, Somerset County College—now known as RVCC—would be built. As we got closer to the College's first commencement ceremony, we had a party on the grounds where the college buildings were starting to emerge. As an active construction site, it was amazing to see some of the buildings that were under construction. We knew the College would be opening up on that site in just a few short years.

As the initial class approached graduation, the College was a big help in finding many of us jobs. In 1970, the College was able to assist me in landing my first career-related job, at American Hoechst—a place where I continued working on the computers for the next 42 years (including through various name changes and mergers—including Hoechst Celanese, Fast-

Serve, Triaton, and ultimately, Hewlett Packard).

Though I retired in 2012, I stayed busy. I helped out our Somerville High School class reunion, and because of my experience with computers, I was hired at “Corporate Marketing” (which was eventually purchased by ArtCraft), where I continued to use my computer knowledge.

It continues to amaze me—the things that I've been able to do, and organizations I've been able to help, from the knowledge and experience in computers that all began as the first student accepted at Somerset County College. Time with RVCC: 3+ years

My connection to RVCC starts with my parents' story. After fleeing to America from a war-torn Vietnam, the families who sponsored them enrolled them in a BOCES ESL course at Nassau Community College on Long Island so they could learn English and find jobs. That

opportunity helped them establish roots here, and it is one reason I believe RVCC matters. It changes trajectories in a very real, very practical way. Many institutions talk about access, opportunity, and community. RVCC actually delivers it.

One of the things I value most about RVCC is that it meets people where they are. Not everyone has a straight-line path. Some students arrive right after high school. Others are balancing jobs, family responsibilities, financial pressure, or the uncertainty of trying to figure out what comes next. RVCC creates an environment that says you still belong here and that you still have the ability to build something meaningful. Coming from a family that understands what it means to build a future from scratch, I do not take that kind of access lightly.

As someone who spends much of my professional life building organizations, scaling systems, and helping teams perform at a high level, I have a deep appreciation for institutions that create leverage. RVCC is exactly that kind of institution. It does not just educate students, it expands the capacity of the entire region. It strengthens workforces, creates-mobility for families, and builds confidence, momentum, and dignity. When you support RVCC, you are making a practical investment with visible downstream effects.

Serving on the RVCC Foundation Board has only reinforced that belief for me. It has given me a closer view into how much thoughtful work goes into opening doors for students and how important philanthropy can be in helping those doors stay open. Scholarships, support programs, and targeted investments are not abstract line items. They can be the difference between a student dropping out and a student finishing, or between someone seeing college as out of reach and seeing it as something that belongs to them.

Infrastructure is at the core of my work, but people are what make RVCC a wonderful place. As part of the Facilities and Grounds department, my job is to support environmental sustainability on our campus, which is primarily about the physical spaces here. I try to make our campus more sustainable through projects and outreach that support energy and water conservation, reducing greenhouse gas emissions, wildlife-friendly landscaping, and waste reduction. Collaboration with students, staff, and faculty across departments broadens the scope of sustainability projects that are possible and keeps these projects

focused on things that matter to our campus community.

I'm honored to serve as chair of the Forum Environmental Sustainability Committee and work with committee members who take time out of their regular work and studies to apply their expertise to campus sustainability. Their commitment to protecting the environment and making RV a better place to learn and work inspires me. A retiring faculty member told me she eagerly awaits passing the one-year mark when she is allowed to become a volunteer and support the sustainability committee again. Graduating student members said they want to come back and help out (to which I said, only if they have time after getting involved at their transfer schools). The students on the committee bring ideas, questions, perspective, and drive that inspires me. When I feel like a project I want to tackle is too ambitious or I feel weighed down by the barriers to achieving it, the spark that the students bring helps to motivate me.

This spring, the Sustainability Committee hosted a panel discussion on eliminating greenhouse gas emissions, featuring speakers who are leaders in state and local decarbonization work. This was a team effort, from the initial idea to planning and execution of the event. Another testament to how RVCC draws people in and keeps them connected: two participants—the moderator and a panelist—were former RVCC employees who continue to support our programs.

Focusing on sustainability was a career change for me. Previously, I worked in education management, most recently in higher education. When I was in graduate school for sustainability science a few years ago, I decided I wanted to continue working in higher education because it's an exciting and engaging place for sustainability. Higher education is the perfect proving ground for sustainability innovations, and colleges benefit from sustainable practices in many ways: cost savings, reputation, learning opportunities, resilience, and community engagement.

As a first-generation student, stepping into college came with both excitement and uncertainty. I was navigating a completely new environment while still trying to figure out who I was and who I wanted to become. I did not have everything planned out—I just knew I wanted to grow, even if I were not sure what that growth would look like yet.

Looking back, most of what I have today did not happen all at once. It came from small decisions, moments of uncertainty, and choosing to say yes even when I was not fully confident. I started by getting involved as a student ambassador, not fully realizing how much that one decision would shape my experience. It pushed me out of my comfort zone and forced me to talk to people, represent the College, and begin seeing myself as someone who could be trusted with responsibility.

From there, I became a campus tour guide and orientation leader. Those roles meant a lot to me because I saw myself in the students; I was welcoming. Many of them were nervous, unsure, and trying to find their place just like I once was. Being in that position made me realize that growth is not just about what you achieve, but about how you help others feel seen and supported while they are still figuring things out.

One opportunity slowly led to another. Serving as President of the Muslim Student

Association was not something I ever imagined for myself in the beginning. It developed over time through showing up consistently, taking initiative, and caring deeply about building a space where students felt like they belonged. Through that role, I learned that leadership is not about having all the answers; it is about listening, bringing people together, and creating space for others to be heard. I learned how to plan events, handle responsibility, and most importantly, how to lead with empathy.

I did not walk into any of those roles knowing exactly what to do. 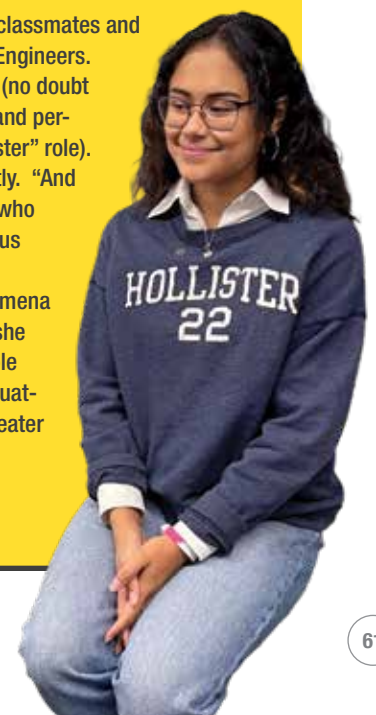

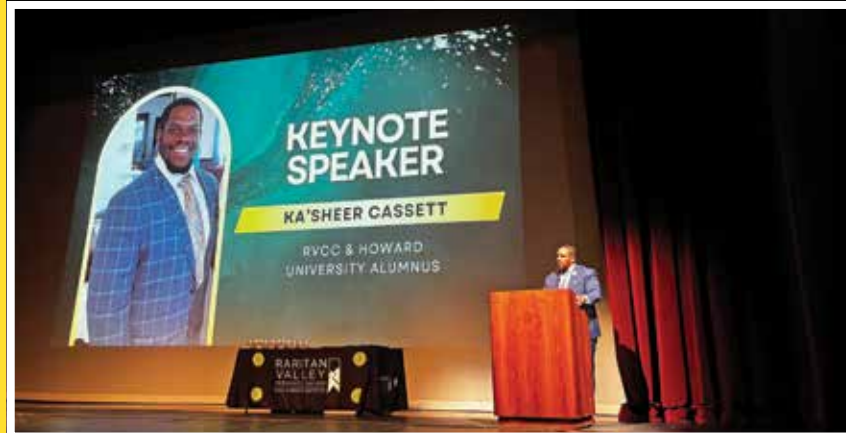

His efforts have been recognized with some very public acknowledgment—when we last caught up with him, he had just been honored with the GRAND PRIZE by the Global Citizen Waislitz Awards in recognition of his social impact work with those experiencing extreme poverty. In 2023, he was honored as CNN Hero of the year finalist, and last year was awarded the “Distinguished Alumnus Award” by the New Jersey Council of County Colleges in Atlantic City. Osei, who was a 2023-24 RVCC Distinguished Alumni Awardee, was recognized “For visionary leadership and significant contributions that have brought honor to New Jersey's Community Colleges.” Most recently, his impact and vision have earned him selection as one of the inaugural Africa Big Bets Fellows by the The Rockefeller Foundation, a prestigious fellowship recognizing 10 exceptional changemakers across the African continent who are driving bold, locally rooted solutions to some of Africa's most pressing challenges. Said Osei, “I am thrilled to be part of the fellowship and opportunity to learn how to advance my solution to help more local communities in Ghana.”

His responsibilities—setting up live streams, filming games, managing social media, and departmental photographer—set him up for the future.

"RVCC helped me realize just how much I was capable of," Ivan noted. "Through my work at RVCC Athletics, I gained hands-on experience, but more importantly, I gained confidence. I learned how to take advantage of opportunities, push myself, and think bigger about my future."

Ivan credits the support of dedicated mentors like Coach Kevin Ryan and Coach Phil Herro for playing a huge role in his growth. "They challenged me, believed in me, and helped me see a path forward when I wasn't sure what mine looked like. They were family."

As for life at C-SPAN and Ceasefire, Ivan continues to grow and develop. "This is such a great opportunity, and an exceptional organization to be part of. And to be in the Nation's Capital, with all that's going on in the world, is about as good as it can get in my profession."

Available to all students with a strong preference for female students; applicants can be first- or second-year students and can be enrolled in either traditional academic credit programs or workforce training programs.

ADULT LEARNERS

J.S. HENDERSON MEMORIAL ADULT SCHOLARSHIP

Available to students that are 25 years or older and are enrolled full-or part-time and residing in Hunterdon or Somerset counties.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

HELENA GARDNER SCHOLARSHIP

Recipients must be in the Occupational Therapy Assistant program and plan to complete an Associate's degree; students must be enrolled full-time, with special consideration given to students who are also serving as a primary caregiver.

It represents a story of hard work, family, and resilience. It reminds me that behind every student’s success story is a community that believes in the power of education.”

To the Rosero Family,

I wanted to thank you for the honor of this scholarship, and to also acknowledge Kevin’s values and how much I admire what he did and intended to do throughout his life. By no means can I even comprehend the lasting impact that Kevin left on the world, and what he meant to so many different people. But I want to begin with an admiration of his values.

Specifically, I saw that Kevin intended on becoming an immigration lawyer. I really resonate with this particular aspiration of his, as immigration can be a brutal process in the United States, depending on one’s situation and resources. I come from a first-generation household, where neither of my parents’ attended college and both immigrated to the U.S. in their mid-20s (father from Peru, mother from Colombia). I know that their process was particularly difficult, and my mom specifically had a hard-time getting citizenship. She did not speak the language when she came, and had to work extremely hard to eventually find a consistent home for herself.

I admire that Kevin wanted to make immigration easier for individuals like my mother, and I thought that was really commendable. I want to study some degree of political science when I eventually transfer from Raritan Valley Community College, and my family has instilled in me values of respect and empathy for immigrants. My dad routinely sends money to immigrants who do not have access to the resources that they need, and I also plan on continuing that family tradition when I grow older as well.

Kevin’s values are ones that I greatly admire and will try to uphold in my life, and I offer my deepest thanks for being awarded the scholarship that bears his name.

It is a full circle moment, and a reminder of the power of philanthropy and its potential to positively impact lives.

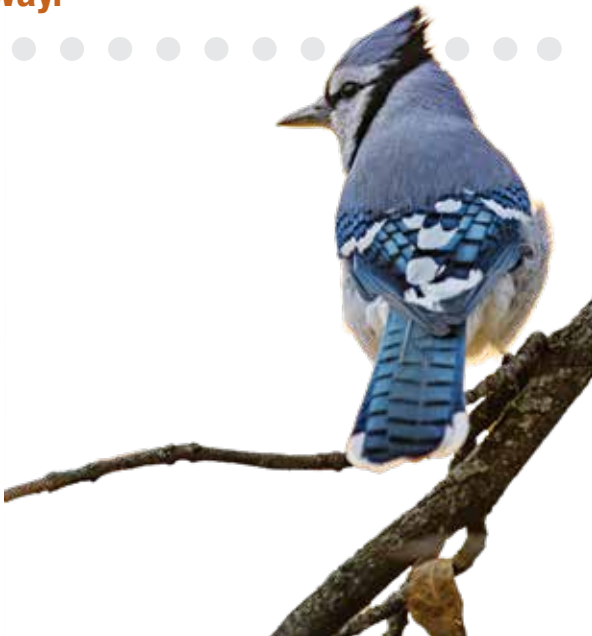


THE RV TRAIL

For some, it’s no surprise that “a favorite place” can be a college campus. Especially one with its own hiking trail, featuring pockets of respite and joy to discover along the way.



BUILDING A “STRONGER, MORE COMPASSIONATE CAMPUS”



Tierra Hall-Edward hopes people understand that frequenting the Raritan Valley Community College Resource Center and Food Pantry represents an act of strength, not failure. “In truth,” says Hall-Edward, Director of Counseling Services, “it shows strength and connection, reflecting our ‘from RVCC, for RVCC’ spirit. The Pantry isn’t charity; it’s community. It exists to support everyone in the RVCC family, helping us care for one another, and building a stronger, more compassionate campus.”

At Raritan Valley Community College and across the country, food insecurity is a real threat to many college students. Food insecurity describes someone not being able to attain enough food, or have the proper quality of food, to meet their basic needs. It can go far beyond hunger, however, affecting their mental health, academic performance, and life outside of school. Nationally, 40% of all college students and 47% of community college students experience food insecurity. And the situation is only getting more severe. At RVCC, there were 9440 visits to the Resource Center & Food Pantry in 2025, representing a 21% increase from the previous year.

ADDRESSING BASIC NEEDS

Open to the entire College community, the RVCC Resource Center and Food Pantry, which

Hall-Edward supervises, addresses food insecurity and provides students with the basic needs to help keep them in school. The goal, she explains, is to alleviate any barriers that might prevent students from achieving their educational goals.

In her role at RVCC, Hall-Edward supports and leads mental health staff and campus-wide efforts focused on student well-being and access to care. Her hard work and dedication have not gone unnoticed: She was honored by the Somerset County Business Partnership as one of the *Class of 2025 40 Under 40*. According to information from the SCBP, the recipients are “a distinguished group of young

professionals who are driving innovation, strengthening the local economy, and making a meaningful impact across the community.” Hall-Edward brings several years of experience in higher education to her position—including close to four years at RVCC and about five years at Rockland Community College—along with a strong clinical background in counseling services. She received a BA in Psychology from City College – New York and an MS in Mental Health Counseling from Long Island University.

Her background is valuable as she supervises staff at the Resource Center, which helps students in a variety of ways, including providing appropriate attire for job interviews, along with every-day and seasonal clothing to meet students’ year-round needs. The Center also can offer financial support such as gas cards and grocery store cards, book vouchers, transportation assistance, loaning of laptops, and housing and medical resources.

Located at the back of the Resource Center, the Food Pantry is lined with shelves stocked with non-perishable grocery items, including canned vegetables and soups, pasta, dry cereals and oats, peanut butter and jelly, packaged macaroni and cheese, and more.

To assist in its efforts, the College greatly benefits from a wide range of donations to the Center and Food Pantry from community partners each year, including over \$1,000

worth of fresh produce, meat, dairy products, and pantry items from the weekly Wegmans on-campus delivery; clothing and food provided by the Somerset Food Bank; contributions from the Community Food Bank of New Jersey; and additional financial support from community donors, including student associations, faculty, and staff. For those in need, the Center also receives donations of menstrual and sanitary products and diapers for family care.

Students also benefit from the Center in other ways, such as volunteering there as part of their service learning experience through The Pray Family Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement at RVCC.

As one student, who did not wish to be identified, notes, “I was first introduced to the Resource Center via service learning. That experience allowed me to learn about all the amazing work that the Resource Center does and allowed me to play a part in it. What I love most is the community that the Center creates. I always loved seeing the same faces come into the Center and seeing community ties being formed. A lot of people would come to grab snacks, groceries, or menstrual/household items from our pantry, or grab clothes from our free clothes shop, or others would just come to sit in the Resource Center because it felt like a safe and comfortable space.”

The student adds, “Providing people with access to resources and basic needs is very important, and I think that resources are a vital part of RVCC, ensuring everyone on campus has their needs met. On a personal level, the Center has inspired me to be more involved in my community at RVCC and my community back home. The Resource Center has definitely become my favorite part of RVCC.”

Asked whether students’ needs have changed since she’s been involved with the Resource Center and Food Pantry, Hall-Edward says, “The core needs like housing, financial stability, and access to food have always been there. What’s changed is the complexity and scale of those needs. We’re seeing growing instability as students navigate rising costs, limited resources, and broader economic challenges.”

She continues, “At the same time, funding cuts to community organizations and food pantries mean there’s less support available to meet increasing demand. Students today are juggling more uncertainty, often in multiple areas of their lives. So, while the needs themselves haven’t changed, the challenges around meeting them have become more sophisticated and urgent.”

“GENEROSITY & GRATITUDE”

There were little moments—and big news—as the RVCC community came together to raise funds (and donate food products) to address food insecurity on the campus of Raritan Valley Community College. Some 80 guests attended November’s “Evening of Generosity & Gratitude” event, which required a donation of \$30—in ShopRite gift cards, grab-and-go food items, or as a financial contribution. And each \$30 earned a 2X match from the Board of Directors of the RVCC Foundation—generously initiated by vice chair, Dan Van Tran—for every attendee.

In total, some \$68,000 was raised—thanks in large part to a \$50,000 anonymous gift to the RVCC Resource Center & Food Pantry, which was announced as part of the evening’s celebration. The event also served as a ceremonial kick off for the last stretch of the RVCC Foundation’s end-of-year fundraising campaign, which seeks to bring in more support for RVCC students facing food insecurity. When Stephany, Shawn, and Shayna Rumrill of Flemington graduated from Raritan Valley Community College as members of the Class of 2016, they were one entity: triplets receiving their Associate Degrees from the College.

Together, they were homeschooled before coming to RVCC. At the College, all three had perfect, 4.0 grade point averages and received Academic Awards in their respective majors—Shawn for Pre-Medical Professional, Shayna for Chemistry, and Stephany for Education (P-5). One of the triplets, Shawn, also served as the Student Commencement Speaker. After graduating, the triplets all transferred to The College of New Jersey (TCNJ).

But 10 years later, after graduating from TCNJ, each sibling has forged their own path. Shawn is a scientist at Merck; Stephany is a special education teacher; and Shayna is a process engineer for Axalta Coating Systems. Their journeys are different, but one thing remains in common: RVCC has had a profound impact on their lives. Here are their stories and their thoughts about Raritan Valley Community College:

STEPHANY RUMRILL PALACIO

Stephany Rumrill Palacio, a resident of Hamilton, has pursued her passion for education as a special education teacher in the Lawrence Township Public Schools.

After graduating from TCNJ with degrees in Education and Psychology in 2019, she continued her studies, earning a Master's Degree in Special Education from TCNJ in 2021. Her future goals include working in higher education in an administrative role.

Reflecting on her time at RVCC, Stephany says the College gave her a “fantastic foundation to higher education.” She notes, “I absolutely adored each of my professors and appreciated the small class sizes at RV, allowing for personalized instruction and support.”

Raritan Valley also was the place that launched her career in education. “My first teaching job occurred at The Children's Campus at RVCC, where I had the privilege of working with inquisitive preschoolers and learning from amazing teachers and teacher assistants. Along with work experience, my Education classes at RVCC allowed me to step into local classrooms for observation hours and opportunities to network with professionals in the field.”

Stephany says she is especially appreciative of her RVCC professors, whom she



describes as “kind, intelligent, and supportive.” They added to her educational experience, she says, by helping her feel motivated and interested in her classes.

Going to RVCC and TCNJ with her brother and sister was “the best,” according to Stephany. They carpooled to college together, and “it was always nice to hear about Shawn and Shayna's days and share stories. I enjoyed hearing about their experiences and seeing

them both develop their specialties and interests in science. It was a unique honor to spend my college years with my siblings before we each went our separate ways personally and professionally. I'm very grateful for those years together, and I'm thrilled to have celebrated each other's successes.”

In addition to having her siblings with her at college, Stephany says she made lifelong friendships at RVCC, including her most important one: her now-husband, Javier Palacio.

SHAYNA RUMRILL

Now living in Greensboro, NC, Shayna Rumrill is a process engineer for Axalta Coating Systems. Her position is based in a manufacturing plant that creates paint for building products, such as siding, floors, and cabinets. Shayna helps monitor, troubleshoot, and optimize the processing of products from the R&D formulation stage all the way through the manufacturing process and quality control.

After graduating from TCNJ in 2018 with a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry, Shayna continued her higher education and received a PhD in Chemical Engineering from Drexel University, Philadelphia, in 2024. Her future plans include continuing a career in the paints and coatings

industry, where she hopes to become a group leader or fellow, working on innovations in coating formulas and technologies.

For Shayna, RVCC was the place where she found herself—personally, academically, and professionally. Because Shayna, like her siblings, had been homeschooled since kindergarten, “being in a classroom with a teacher and other students was foreign to me. I wasn't sure I would be able to do well in that new environment. I had extreme social anxiety.” Shayna credits her “excellent professors” and classmates with helping her achieve success. She explored various STEM subjects at the

Shawn Rumrill is a senior scientist in Preclinical Biologics Development at Merck. In that role, the Flemington resident helps take molecules, such as antibodies to treat cancer, out of the lab and into the clinic to serve the needs of patients around the world.

After graduating from TCNJ in 2018 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry, Shawn completed his PhD in Chemistry and Chemical Biology at Rutgers University. At the same time, he participated in internships at Amicus Therapeutics, a rare disease company; Matinas Biopharma, an antifungal company;

Educationally, RVCC offered him the opportunity to explore different subjects before he found his true passion. Recalling that he changed his major three times, Shawn says, “At each point, I found myself gravitating more and more toward life sciences—subjects I never had confidence in during high school. However, I was inspired by incredible professors from anatomy and physiology, to chemistry and biology.” He adds, “RVCC was a place that made me excited for each of my classes every day. Even better, a little friendly sibling competition always kept me motivated to do my best.” Outside of the classroom, Shawn became

College and developed a strong interest in engineering and chemistry and began to see a possible career path.

At the same time, “I became more confident in myself, which was greatly helped by meeting people like Professors Antonella Pompo and Peter Stupak, who always believed in me. I learned many important types of skills at RVCC, such as teamwork, leadership, and independent research. These are some of the core pieces of my current career.”

Shayna says she enjoyed the smaller classes at RVCC, which enabled her to interact better with her professors, who were “easily approachable and personable.” Both in and out of the classroom, “It felt like there was always someone there to support you, whether that was in relation to classwork or finding your overall path with the career center and advisor staff. It truly felt like a second home to me.” But she still felt challenged academically and well prepared for the future.

Attending both RVCC and TCNJ with Stephany and Shawn was a definite benefit as well for Shayna. “There is something special about always having a friendly face around.”

She continues, “It's nice to know that from the first day of college, you know someone on the campus, someone that you can talk to about your day. It takes away some of the isolation and awkwardness that you might feel otherwise.”



and Merck, a pharmaceutical company.

Shawn says he would like to continue growing professionally in the pharmaceutical industry, with one day leading teams to address some of the world's most challenging scientific questions that make profound impacts on healthcare.

Shawn's RVCC educational experience impacted him in several ways, he says. It was his first time “adulting,” and attending the College with his siblings, and interacting with so many people from different backgrounds and ages, helped him transition into the next stage of life with greater ease. “I am confident that being surrounded by so many unique and amazing students from all different backgrounds and circumstances truly enriched my experience and perspective, setting the stage for my personal and professional growth,” he says.

involved on campus in leadership roles with RVCC's Student Government Association. Before that experience, he says, “I never thought of myself as a leader. My original intention in going to college was to keep my head down, keep a decent GPA, and graduate with a degree. However, the incredible opportunities for scholarships, student activities, honor societies, etc., were irresistible, and the energy from campus faculty, staff, and students involved was contagious.” Shawn says his RVCC leadership roles fostered his interest in networking and building relationships that continued into graduate school at Rutgers University, when he headed one of the largest University Graduate Student Governments. It also gave him the confidence to lead conferences, workshops, committees, and other activities that have helped him throughout his professional career.

Shawn also enjoyed going to college with his siblings. “There was always someone nearby to share successes and wins over lunch or on the commute home. At a time of discovering yourself and navigating a new world in college, there is a lot of comfort in knowing your lifelong best friends and family are doing it with you. Most people don't get to have that experience, and I consider myself incredibly lucky!”

Bulgaro, an Honors College student and Social Sciences major who graduated from the College in May, has been recognized by several groups for her outstanding civic leadership efforts.

OUTSTANDING WOMAN

Manuela Bulgaro was honored this past spring by the Somerset County Commission on the Status of Women in its 2026 Outstanding Women of Somerset County Awards program. The annual event, which featured keynote speaker Congresswoman Bonnie Watson Coleman, was held at Roycebrook Country Club in Hillsborough.

Bulgaro, who was nominated by several people at RVCC and in the community for the award, was honored in the Government/Public/Social Service category. She was presented the award by Somerset County Commission on the Status of Women member, Rheanah Johnson.

At RVCC, Bulgaro has integrated academic learning with civic leadership. She has served as President of the Criminal Justice, Student Government Association Senator, Vice President

of Finance and Logistics for the Debate Team, a Phi Theta Kappa scholar, and Student Voter Engagement Ambassador. In these roles, she organized civic education initiatives, voter registration drives, and community-based projects, earning recognition through the President's Volunteer Service Award.

KESSELMAN FELLOW

Bulgaro's yearlong accolades began last summer, when she was named the Engage NJ Kesselman Fellow for the Advancement of Democracy for the 2025-2026 academic year. The position was announced by The Pray Family Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement at RVCC.

In that role, Bulgaro co-developed the project, The Republic We Keep, A Podcast on American Systems, Voices, & Values. The Republic We Keep is a student-led civic podcast created by Bulgaro and Aiden Annis, a Rutgers University sophomore who is majoring in Electrical Engineering and minoring in Political Science. The Fellowship included a \$1,000 honorarium to support the project during the academic year.

“Former Engage NJ board chair and president of Stockton University, Dr. Harvey Kesselman, continues even now in retirement to be an advocate for the advancement of human rights. RVCC's Kesselman Fellows seek to walk a similar path with their project called, The Republic We Keep. And so, when I look to

In addition to the honorarium, the Fellowship provides professional pathway coaching and the chance to participate in a series of skills development opportunities focusing on such areas as consensus-building, public speaking, and professional communication, designed to meet students' self-identified needs. 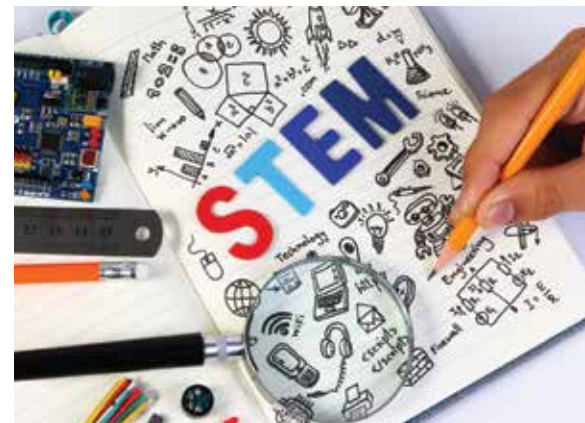

Bulgaro also served as Creative Director last summer with the Annis Young Innovators Initiative, Mission: Safe Landing, held at the Hillsborough Municipal Building.

Bulgaro volunteered along with RVCC student Michela Ruffa, who served in the role of Student Nurse & Youth Engagement Support, as

well as several students from Rutgers University School of Engineering.

During the peer-to-peer mentorship program, led by the college students, more than 30 sixth graders learned about physics, gravity, and other topics, and helped design a rocket that would keep a raw egg intact when dropped from a certain height.

As the Creative Director for the STEM workshop, Bulgaro first proposed the project to the Hillsborough Recreation Department, secured sponsors, and coordinated key components to bring it to fruition.

“WHY LOCAL ELECTIONS MATTER”

In her role as RVCC Student Voting Engagement Ambassador, Bulgaro also organized a campus event this past fall that offered students the opportunity to hear from elected officials, campus leaders, and civic engagement experts about the importance of registering to vote and participating in the electoral process.

More than 50 students attended the event, “Why Local Elections Matter,” which focused on the significance of student participation in shaping the future of their communities and the nation. The program's highlight was a panel discussion featuring Assemblyman Roy Freiman, Assemblywoman Michelle Drulis, and Committeewoman Samatha Hand.

The event was part of a larger, ongoing effort by the College to promote civic engagement through a collaboration with Student Life, Student Government/RVCC Clubs, and The Pray Family Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement.

Participants included students from several criminal justice classes taught by

Robert Cacciatore, Assistant Professor of Criminal Justice, and members of the RVCC Criminal Justice Student Club.

Throughout the program, students learned how policies set at the local, state, and national levels directly impact issues relevant to them, such as college tuition, housing, and job opportunities. The “Why Local Elections Matter” event included ballot initiatives, a debate on local issues, and the opportunity to meet community leaders.

AFTER RVCC

The future continues to look bright for Bulgaro, who is also the College's nominee for the nationally recognized Newman Civic Fellow. The prestigious honor, established by Campus Compact, is a yearlong program that recognizes students who stand out for their leadership potential and commitment to creating positive change in communities.

Bulgaro's plans also include transferring to a four-year school to study philosophy on a pre-law track, with the goal of attending law school and pursuing a career focused on public service, constitutional law, and strengthening democratic institutions.

STUDENT NAMED SEMIFINALIST FOR COMPETITIVE NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP

RVCC student Jei Budiharto of Piscataway was named a semifinalist for the highly competitive Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship, it was announced by the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation.

The RVCC Honors College member joined a group of 485 semifinalists across the country for the scholarship, which supports the nation's top community college students with financial need seeking to complete a bachelor's degree at four-year colleges or universities.

Selected from a pool of more than 1,300 applicants, this year's semifinalists represented 224 community colleges across 37 states. Each was chosen through an evaluation process that assesses academic ability, achievement, perseverance, and leadership.

Budiharto, an Engineering major focusing on Biomedical Engineering, graduated from

RVCC in May. They plan to transfer to a four-year school to pursue a degree in Neuroscience or Biomedical Engineering. Budiharto was active on campus as Vice President of Information and Media for the Student Government Association (SGA), a member of the Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society, and Internal Coordinator for the Filipino Peace Club. In addition, they worked as a part-time tutor at the College's Tutoring Center.

The Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship enables recipients to complete their bachelor's degrees debt-free at any accredited four-year college or university in the United States and provides last-dollar funding of up to \$55,000 per year for two to three years. The award is designed to remove financial barriers so that high-achieving community college students can transfer to and thrive at the nation's top institutions.

“Through the Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship, the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation works to ensure that exceptional community college students have the opportunities to reach their full academic potential,” said Executive Director Giuseppe “Seppy” Basili. “This year's semifinalists reflect the remarkable talent and ambition found in community colleges nationwide.”

The Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship provides comprehensive support that extends far beyond financial assistance, recognizing that admission and enrollment are only the beginning. Selected Cooke Transfer Scholars receive personalized educational advising from the Foundation's Deans of Scholar Support,

who guide them through the transition to a four-year institution and help prepare them for future careers. Scholars also gain access to transformative opportunities including internships, study abroad experiences, and graduate school funding, as well as inclusion in a thriving community of more than 3,800 fellow Cooke Scholars and Alumni who provide mentorship and networking connections throughout their academic and professional lives.

Budiharto’s leadership skills were on display this past winter, when they collaborated with Middlesex College student Nina Salam-atova on an event that fostered community engagement between the two colleges.

Titled “Interactive Dialogue,” the program at Middlesex College brought together students, faculty, and staff from both colleges to

Budiharto was the event’s co-organizer and co-facilitator and worked directly with Salamatova from Middlesex. The two began brainstorming the event concept at last summer’s Princeton University Transfer Scholars Initiative, a prestigious summer program for community college students that they both attended. He then brought the idea to the Student Life department and the Student Government Association at RVCC.

The cross-campus collaboration, which was hosted by Middlesex College’s Political Science Club, of which Salamatova is the president and founder, featured breakout group discussions focusing on a series of questions. Group members then shared their discussion results with those in attendance, hoping to create a collaboration of ideas and action plans.

STUDENT NAMED TO 2026 ALL IN STUDENT VOTING HONOR ROLL

RVCC student Colin Howell of Readington has been named to the 2026 ALL IN Student Voting Honor Roll, earning national recognition for his leadership in promoting nonpartisan civic engagement. The announcement was made by The Pray Family Center for Service Learning and Civic Engagement in partnership with the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge.

The ALL IN Student Voting Honor Roll recognizes outstanding college students nationwide who demonstrate a strong commitment to increasing democratic participation on their campuses.

Howell, a Liberal Arts major who graduated from RVCC in May, is one of just 168 students across the country selected for this honor. He is being recognized for his work

expanding voter registration, education, and turnout during the 2025 New Jersey gubernatorial election. A key component of his efforts includes his involvement in RVCC’s Service Learning Program, where he served as a poll worker with the Hunterdon County Election Board, Senator Andrew Zwicker’s Office, the Hillsborough Democratic Organization, and Mikie Sherrill’s campaign for Governor of New Jersey.

Howell also has contributed to institutional efforts to expand civic engagement on campus. He worked alongside college administrators and community partners on RVCC’s Civic Action Plan, helping align strategic priorities with innovative approaches to voter education. His contributions have supported the development of new programming and enhanced campus-wide engagement initiatives.

RVCC’s commitment to service learning and civic engagement plays a vital role in student development, equipping learners with

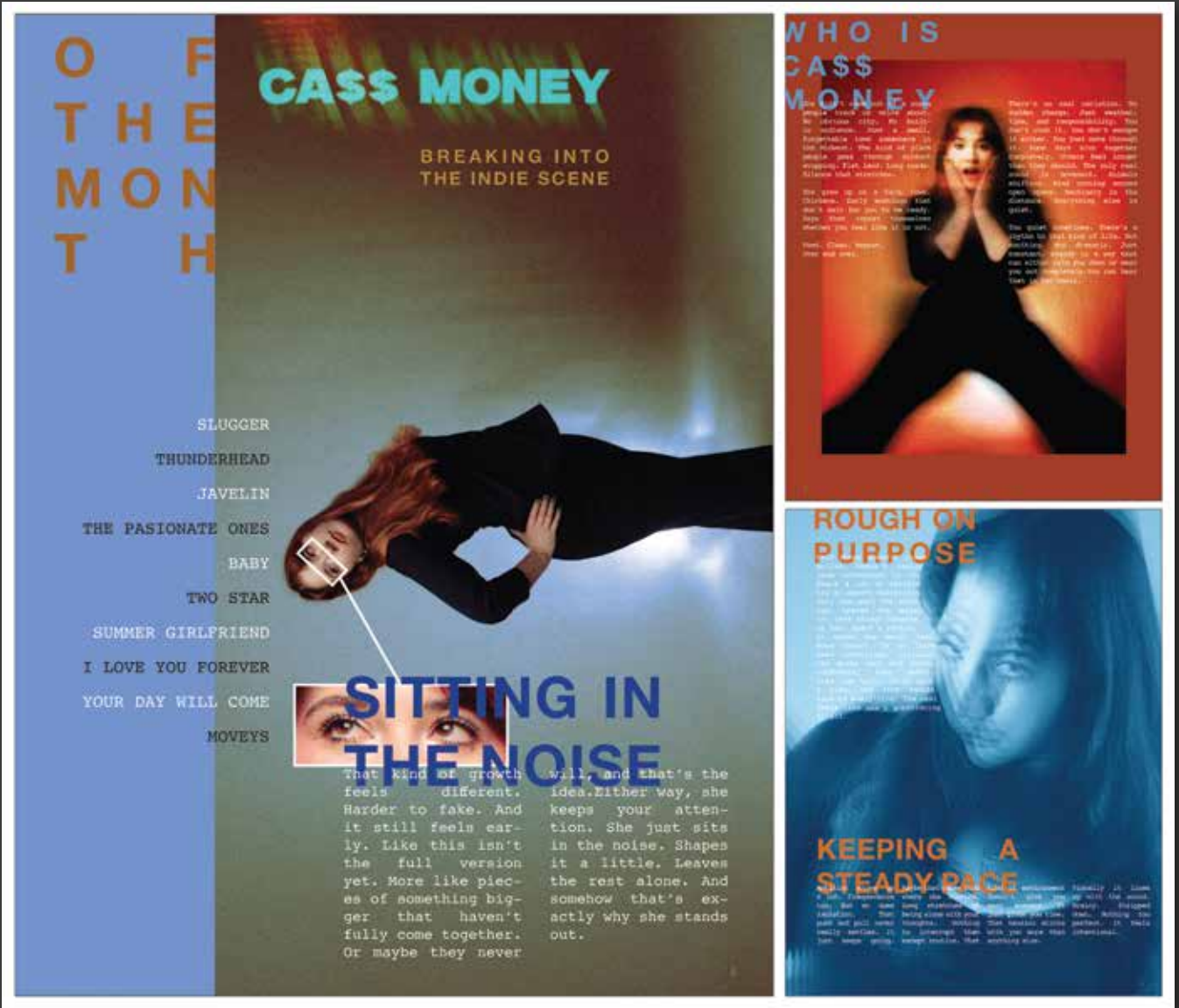

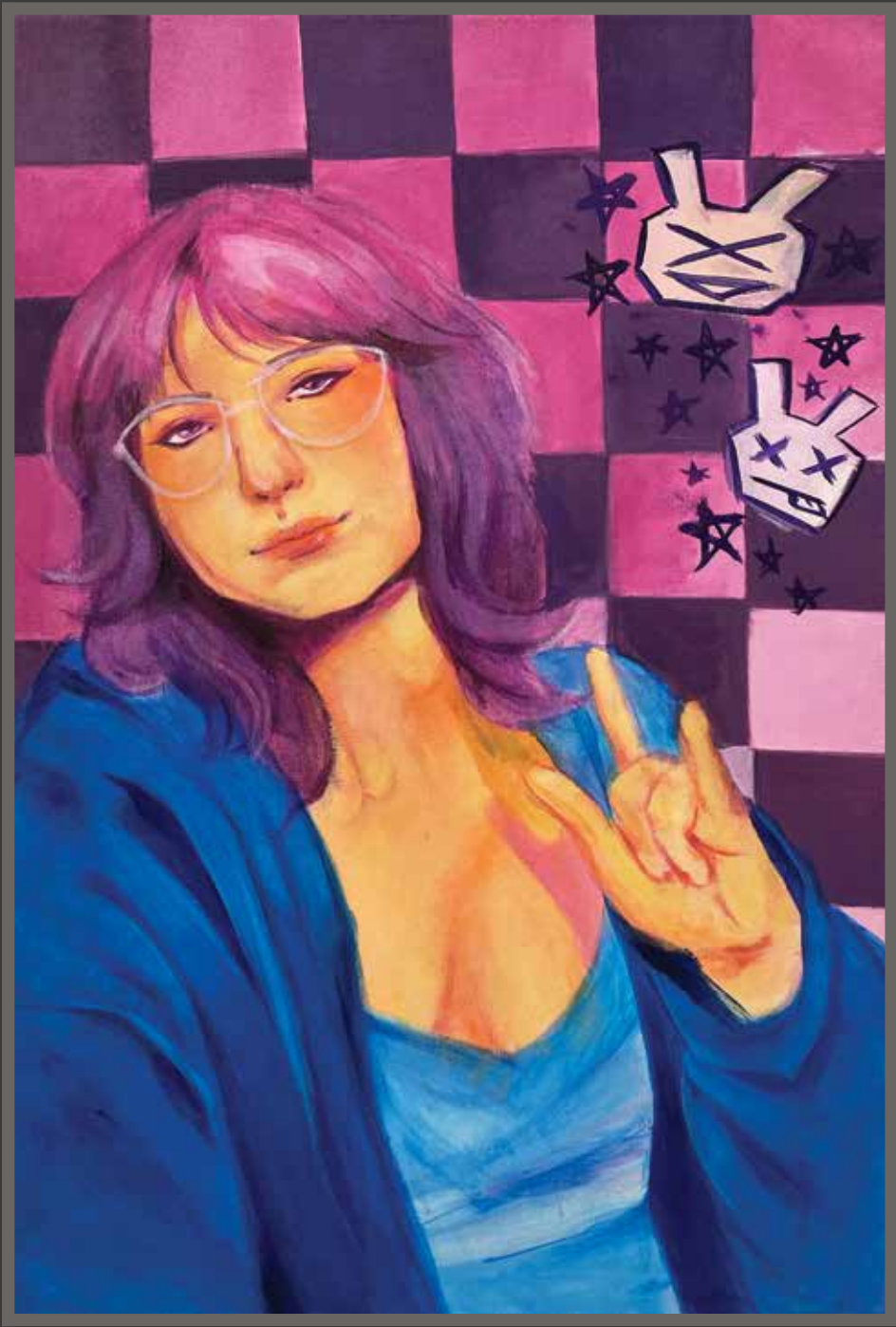

SOARING TO NEW HEIGHTS
IN SUPPORT OF
RARITAN VALLEY COMMUNITY COLLEGE



It was an incredible, record-setting year for the RVCC Foundation, surpassing the \$2 million mark for the first time in the College’s history. The funds raised in 2024-2025—\$2,014,187—is \$971,431 higher than the previous year’s total.

Among the highlights of the year was a record-setting “Giving Day 2025,” during which \$203,655 was raised over 24-hours for scholarships, student clubs, athletic teams, and a range of centers, institutes, and critical programs at RVCC. Results were largely energized by the return of a \$50,000 “match challenge”—generously provided by Jim and Jill Gibson of Basking Ridge and The Caruso Family Foundation—which also inspired the largest single Giving Day gift ever: a \$50,000 contribution from Lori Grossi of Clinton.

The year’s fundraising tally also was aided by the incredible generosity of Frank and Pat Russo, whose longstanding scholarship at RVCC is among the among the most generous. The Russos’ \$375,000 gift—the largest

scholarship commitment in the College’s history—provides five full scholarships for RVCC students in each of the next 10 years. Also adding large, six-figure gifts were Johnson & Johnson in support of the nascent NJBioFutures, and J.S. Henderson Foundation, whose board chose the RVCC Foundation to assume full management and stewardship of the J.S. Henderson Memorial Adult Scholarship—to be exclusively available to students at Raritan Valley Community College in perpetuity. Also notable in the year’s fundraising success:



\$153,000 in proceeds from the 21st Annual RVCC Foundation Golf Classic, which was held at Neshanic Valley Golf Club.

“Our record fundraising success this year is a direct testament to the generosity of our expanding donor community, and their willingness to step up,” said Mike Marion, Executive Director, RVCC Foundation and RVCC Alumni Association. “We had 306 new donors add to the exceptional support of our longstanding benefactors. It is

so encouraging that more and more people are recognizing the value and impact of RVCC, and are choosing to be part of it.”

The RVCC Foundation’s fundraising results were showcased by President Michael J. McDonough during his remarks at RVCC’s “All College Day” event, which each fall welcomes faculty and staff back for the new academic year. “This is an exceptional achievement,” he noted, “and couldn’t be more critical given all of the challenges facing higher education today.”

Martha Salas, Dr. Rikita Singh, and Professor Derek Weber are being honored by Raritan Valley Community College for excellence in their professional roles at the College and service to the campus community for the 2025-2026 academic year.

MARTHA SALAS, a Molecular Biology Lab Assistant III in the Science & Engineering department, is the winner of RVCC’s inaugural **Fulltime Support Staff Presidential Award**. The award acknowledges and recognizes the outstanding performance of a full-time Support Staff member who demonstrates excellence in mastery of the position, commitment to growth, collaboration, and campus engagement.

Recommending her for the honor, a nominator praised Martha Salas’ efforts to prepare the laboratories for classes, stating, “Martha goes beyond preparation—she proactively troubleshoots lab activities in advance, anticipating potential challenges and ensuring student success. Her attention to detail and deep technical knowledge make her an invaluable asset to the department.”

The nominator continued: “Martha’s impact extends far beyond the laboratory. She has a proven history of working effectively with colleagues across departments and plays an active role in supporting institutional initiatives. She has served on numerous search committees for both faculty and staff positions, contributing thoughtful insight and professionalism. She has also supported Workforce Development efforts by assisting with the use of Science Department equipment, coordinating with vendors, and managing materials—including storing perishable items to ensure program continuity.”

Another nominator wrote: “Martha’s scholarly achievements are both impactful and far-reaching. Her knowledge in microbiology and molecular science has significantly supported faculty and advanced RVCC students’



understanding in these areas, as evidenced by a strong record of student success. Faculty consistently praise her content knowledge and strong work ethic. Martha is reliable, responsible, and dependable.”

Martha Salas has worked at RVCC for close to 23 years, becoming an experienced laboratory specialist in molecular biology, biotechnology, and microbiology in higher education. She holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Biology with a focus in Genetics from Universidad del Valle in Cali, Colombia, and a Master’s Degree in Biotechnology from

Kean University. Throughout her career, Ms. Salas has been dedicated to maintaining high-standard laboratory environments. Her work focuses on supporting microbiology, genetics, and cell molecular labs. She is passionate about science and creating inclusive lab environments that foster curiosity, innovation, and equity in STEM. From overseeing reagents and equipment to supporting faculty, Ms. Salas strives to foster and support a STEM environment where all students can succeed. She always has been interested in connecting with educators and biotechnology professionals dedicated to hands-on research experience that can strengthen students’ competitiveness for both the workforce and at four-year institutions.

FULLTIME FACULTY EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING AWARD

Professor Derek Weber, Professor of Microbiology, has been awarded the Fulltime Faculty Excellence in Teaching Award for 2025–2026, recognizing his exceptional commitment to student learning, instructional innovation, and academic excellence.

Dr. Weber received 13 separate nominations for the award. Students describe the faculty member and his classes as engaging, enthusiastic, passionate, accessible, extremely interesting, and fun. While his expectations in

class are high, Dr. Weber remains approachable and inviting, according to his students. One person said they grew from a shy student to an avid participant because the student wanted to keep up with Dr. Weber’s energy.

One nominator wrote: “Energy comes from the genuine enthusiasm this faculty member brings to biology. Support is consistent and proactive. . . . His calm and confident presence contributes to a classroom culture grounded in respect and intellectual engagement. . . . What changed most was my approach to learning science after studying with this faculty member. Previously, memorization shaped much of my preparation. His teaching redirected attention toward understanding processes and conceptual relationships. Recognizing connections among ideas became more



important than recalling isolated facts.”

Dr. Weber’s colleagues praise him for his commitment to staying ahead of the curve, including integrating AI into assessments and activities. He is also a faculty champion for digital accessibility.

Dr. Weber joined Raritan Valley Community College in 2008, following three years as an Assistant Professor at Broward College. He earned a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry from Moravian University and completed his PhD in Biomolecular Chemistry at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

Widely respected for his dynamic, student-centered approach to teaching biology, Dr. Weber designs courses that emphasize active learning, scientific literacy, and realworld application. His teaching approach enables students to master complex scientific concepts while developing confidence, curiosity, and strong critical-thinking skills. Through innovative pedagogy, intentional use of instructional technology, and inclusive classroom practices, he fosters learning environments in which students feel both challenged and supported.

In addition to his teaching excellence, Dr. Weber is an active scholar and contributor to the broader academic community. He has served as an invited presenter at professional and academic conferences on topics such as microbiology education, career readi-

ness, student engagement, and emerging technologies, including artificial intelligence. His scholarly work also includes authorship on three academic publications, most notably as a coauthor of *Microbiology: An Introduction* (Pearson Education, 14th edition), an internationally adopted textbook used by colleges and universities throughout North America and multiple regions worldwide. In 2022, his creation of an engaging, interactive digital laboratory manual for allied health

microbiology students was recognized with the Top Hat Top Author Award.

Dr. Weber is deeply committed to mentorship and service, and works closely with students pursuing careers in healthcare, research, and other science-based professions. He is dedicated to accessibility, continuous improvement, and student success.

FULLTIME ADMINISTRATOR PRESIDENTIAL AWARD

Dr. Rikita Singh, Executive Director of the Office of Student Support, is the recipient

of RVCC’s inaugural Fulltime Administrator Presidential Award. The award acknowledges and recognizes the outstanding performance of a full-time Administrator who demonstrates excellence in mastery of the position, innovation, collaboration, and campus engagement.

In recommending her for the honor, a nominator wrote: “Rikita has built a strong reputation for working collaboratively with colleagues, departments, and partners across the College. Her approach brings people together to ensure students receive coordinated and compassionate support. Colleagues across campus value Rikita not only for her expertise, but also for her openness, willingness to listen, and ability to bring thoughtful solutions to complex challenges.” In addition, Rikita “goes out of her way to advocate for and protect her team, fostering an environment where staff feel supported and valued.”

The nominator added: “Rikita maintains a visible and positive presence within the College community and continually works to make campus life safer, more inclusive, and more supportive for all. At a time when many students are navigating complex challenges in the broader world, her leadership helps create a stronger sense of care, belonging, and stability across campus.”

The praise continued: “Beyond managing several critical areas that support student success, Rikita continues to lead the campus-wide initiative to advance digital accessibility. This work reflects both forward-thinking leadership and a genuine commitment to improving systems and processes so that information and services are accessible to everyone in our community.”

Dr. Singh has spent more than a decade advancing inclusive and accessible educational experiences for students with disabilities. With a professional background in counseling, she began her career in the mental health field, supporting individuals with serious mental health conditions as they worked to reintegrate into their communities, secure employment, and access educational opportunities.

Since joining Raritan Valley Community College in 2017, Dr. Singh has worked closely with a growing number of students seeking support through the Center for Accessibility and Inclusive Education (CAIE). Her work has included developing and securing grant funding to launch a new program serving students with intellectual and developmental disabilities, as well as presenting on a range of topics aimed at fostering a more inclusive, equitable campus community.

Dr. Singh received a Bachelor's Degree in Exercise Science from Rutgers University and a Master's Degree in Rehabilitation Counseling from the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey (now part of Rutgers University). She earned a Doctorate in Educational Leadership from Capella University in 2020, further strengthening her commitment to student support, inclusive practices, and institutional change. Her approach is grounded in collaboration, advocacy, and a deep belief in the transformative power of education.

Mentees and mentors at Insmmed Closing Ceremony



IT'S PEOPLE POWER THAT DRIVES MENTORSHIP PROGRAMS AT RVCC. Invaluable Partners Provide Generous and Insightful Support.

What began with Sanofi some nine years ago, has blossomed into three unique mentorship programs—offered during the 2025-26 year by three distinct companies Sanofi, Insmmed, and J&J—that represent the very best of corporate social responsibility and engagement with RVCC students. And while there are many exceptional things about Raritan Valley Community College, few rival the powerful impact created by matching student and professional, mentee and mentor, college and corporation, all rowing together on a shared mission of enriching the journeys of RVCC students.

Over the last nine years, 136 students have participated in mentorship programming at the College. And since there's a mentor for every

mentee, that's 272 relationships—and all of the inherent collaboration and guidance that implies.

"The Corporate Mentor Program at RVCC has been truly transformational for our students, creating meaningful access to corporate professionals, career opportunities, and networks that many would not otherwise have exposure to," said Alicia Hermo-Weaver, visionary behind the mentorship programs in her capacity as Manager of the Office of Career Success & Experiential Learning at RVCC. "Its lasting impact lies in advancing career equity and creating life-changing connections that empower students to succeed both personally and professionally."

Credit the leadership of Sanofi for placing a

mentorship bet at RVCC back in 2017. This fall, the Sanofi Corporate Mentorship program at the College will enter its 10th year. That's not only a significant milestone, it also represents a major investment of both scholarship support (which all mentees receive)—and more importantly, human capital.

"Having participated in the Sanofi Mentor Program at RVCC over the past three years, I can say without hesitation that this partnership is truly special," said Stefan Roehr, CEO, Gold Bond Co (a unit of Sanofi). "Watching students grow from eager learners into confident, career-ready professionals has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my career. Year after year, this program reinforces why industry-academic collaboration matters—not

just for the students we mentor, but for us as leaders too. It's a privilege to give back to the community while helping shape the next generation of talent and leaders."

Said Daphne Kunukcu (RVCC Class of 2026) of her Insmmed mentorship experience: "I'm so grateful to have been part of this program. The guidance and connections I gained truly made an impact, and I appreciate everything Alicia (Hermo-Weaver) and our Insmmed mentors have done to support us."

The culminating event each year for RVCC's mentorship programs is the 'closing ceremony'—at which, mentors and mentees share what they learned and how much each has benefited from their unique, year-long relationship. Sanofi held its ceremony on the RVCC campus, while Insmmed and J&J hosted at their respective locations. And no surprise, all appreciated the shared benefits to mentor and mentee alike.

"Partnering on the J&J Pilot Mentor Program with Raritan Valley Community College was a truly rewarding experience," said Diana Rosado, Technology LDP Analyst, Technology Services at Johnson & Johnson. "We're deeply grateful to the RVCC Career Success team for

their dedication and leadership and continually impressed by the enthusiasm and talent of the mentees. The experience was equally inspiring for our J&J mentors, and we look forward to continuing this meaningful partnership."

Among the unique characteristics of community colleges is the constant need for financial capital to effectively sustain operations and grow the institution's impact. For students, the financial support of a scholarship can be a lifeline to help address the economic challenges associated with attending college. But as RVCC's mentorship programs reveal, it's the human capital that is the difference maker.

"The Sanofi mentorship program helped me strategize how to work on my presentation skills during our meetings," said Ingrid Medina



(RVCC Class of 2021). "We prepped for informational interviews by role-playing with our mentors, which helped me practice answering interview questions. The job shadow day was also an important opportunity where we got to apply all the skills we learned and network with departments of our interest."

Said Xiomara Castro Ramirez (Class of 2026): "One of the most impactful parts of this program was the opportunity to visit Sanofi and connect with professionals. It made me realize that one day, we will step into those same spaces. And when we do, we have a responsibility to remember those who guided us and to become that same support system for others."

"I also want to recognize all of the mentors involved," added Xiomara. "As an immigrant student, there are moments of uncertainty, moments where you ask yourself, 'What should I do?' or 'Who do I follow?' Even when our families are accomplished in our home countries, navigating a new system can feel very scary. This program gave us something incredibly valuable: guidance we didn't always have access to, and the clarity to move forward with confidence."

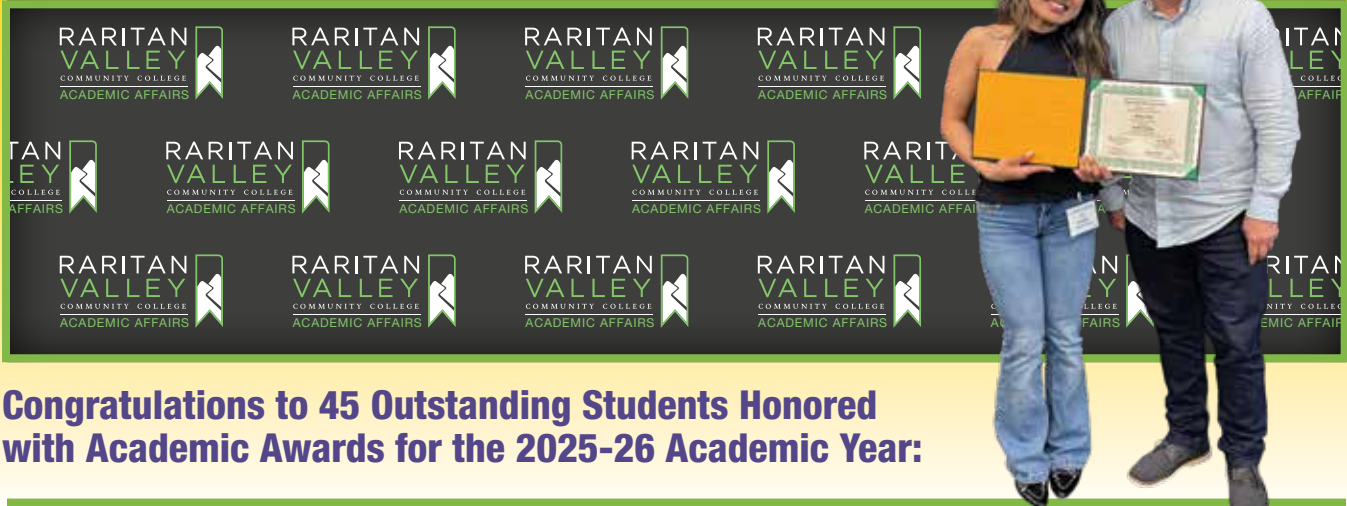

NEW STUDY DEMONSTRATES RVCC’S ROI FOR STUDENTS AND TAXPAYERS

RVCC and its students added \$410 million in income to Somerset and Hunterdon counties’ economies in FY 23-24 and supported 4,204 regional jobs, according to a new economic impact study announced this spring by the College.

The study was commissioned by RVCC as part of a larger statewide study conducted through Lightcast by the New Jersey Council of County Colleges. “The Economic Value of Raritan Valley Community” quantifies the value RVCC brings to the community by promoting economic development, enhancing students’ careers, and improving the quality of life for residents in Somerset and Hunterdon counties.

“The economic impact study confirms what we already knew about Raritan Valley Community College: An investment in RVCC benefits all stakeholders—students, taxpayers, local businesses, and society as a whole,” said RVCC President Michael J. McDonough.

“From preparing students to enter the regional workforce as highly educated, well-skilled employees, to supporting local business by increasing consumer spending, to improving students’ lives by helping to raise their lifetime earnings, to assisting society overall by generating a variety of savings through students’ improved lifestyles, RVCC truly enriches the quality of life for everyone in Somerset and Hunterdon County,” McDonough said.

Data and assumptions used in “The Economic Value of Raritan Valley Community” study are based on several sources, including the FY 2023-24 academic and financial reports from RVCC, industry and employment data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and U.S. Census Bureau, outputs of Lightcast’s Multi-Regional Social Accounting Matrix model, and a variety

of studies and surveys relating education to social behavior. The study applies a conservative methodology and follows standard practice using only the most recognized indicators of economic impact and investment effectiveness.

RVCC’s economic study was part of the larger, statewide NJCCC study, “The Economic Value of New Jersey’s Community Colleges,” which underscored the value of New Jersey’s community colleges to society. The state’s 18 community colleges add \$12.8 billion to New Jersey’s economy, which is approximately 1.6% of the total gross state product. This number reflects an increase in economic activity that supports 135,492 jobs, which is one out of every 46 positions in the state’s employment market.

In addition, for every dollar invested in a New Jersey community college, taxpayers gain \$8 in added revenue from students’ increased lifetime earnings and increased business output, raising economic prosperity in the state. Finally, graduates of a New Jersey community college gain \$4.30 in higher lifetime earnings for every \$1 they invest in their higher education. This equals an average annual return of 14.9%.

KEY FINDINGS

- In FY 2023-24, RVCC and its students added \$410 million in income to Somerset and Hunterdon County economies, supporting 4,204 regional jobs—or 1 out of every 88 jobs in the two counties.
- The net impact of the College’s operations spending added \$44.2 million in income to the regional economy in FY 2023-2024.
- Taxpayers provided RVCC \$35.6 million in funding in FY 2023-2024. In return, they benefited from students’ higher

lifetime earnings and increased business output and purchases of goods and services, amounting to \$93 million.

- For every dollar of public money invested in educating RVCC students, taxpayers will receive \$3.20 in return over the course of the students’ working lives. This represents an annual rate of return of 8.8%, which compares positively to other long-term investments in the public sector.
- The net impact of RVCC alumni currently employed in the regional workforce amounted to \$360.8 million in added income in FY 2023-24, which is equivalent to supporting 3,361 jobs.

BENEFITS TO STUDENTS

- The average student’s income increased by \$3.90 for every \$1 they invested in their education.
- Students enjoy a 14.9% average annual rate of return on their RVCC educational investment.
- The average student who receives an associate degree from RVCC will see an increase in earnings of \$11,400 each year, compared to someone with only a high school diploma or equivalent working in New Jersey.
- As RVCC students are educated, they are statistically more likely to develop healthier lifestyles that lead to reduced government-support services. This leads to \$20.7 million in savings to state and local taxpayers.

at "the Farmhouse" for their return to campus.

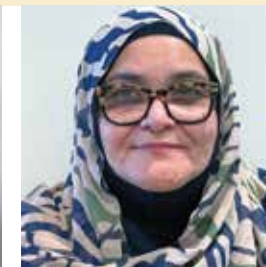

Each year, THE LAST WORD features the remarks of the faculty and student commencement speakers for the RVCC Graduation Ceremony. And this year, we're beginning a new tradition by featuring the thoughts of RVCC President, Michael McDonough.

Dr. Frank Forte, Faculty Commencement Speaker



Dr. Frank Forte of Raritan, Associate Professor of Mathematics, has been teaching mathematics for 28 years, the past 11 of them at RVCC. He received his Bachelor of Arts from Drew University and a Master of Science degree in Mathematics from Montclair State University. He recently completed his PhD in Mathematics Education from Montclair, and his dissertation examined the struggles that preservice elementary school teachers face while solving nonroutine math problems. It also focused on ways to help these future teachers improve their math problem-solving skills and become better educators. At RVCC, in addition to teaching mathematics courses, Dr. Forte serves as the Faculty Liaison to the Honors College and has worked with the College's Concurrent Enrollment program for the past few years.

ASSERTING THE RVCC VOICE

Good Morning Raritan Valley Community College Class of 2026, and congratulations. Congratulations on reaching the beginning.

In my career as both student and teacher, I have graduated several times. And still, I must admit that sometimes words confuse me. This ceremony is called a commencement. To commence means to begin something – but we are at the end of your time here at RVCC. Why not just call it a graduation?

Last year about this time, I also graduated. I finished my doctorate and graduated from Montclair State University. And in the months leading up to that day, I might have traveled some of the same roads that you did. It started when I looked at all the checkmarks in my Degree Works (yes, they have that in graduate school too). Then I saw the comments on my dissertation drafts and realized – this might actually be happening. I might be graduating soon. Now what do I do?

The answer, no matter where you are, is

the same. You should fill out a form and pay a fee. And when I did that, I ended up on an email list of graduation candidates. One day, we all got a message from an exasperated person in the registrar's office with multiple exclamation marks that said "graduation and commencement are not the same thing. Graduation happens on a transcript, Commencement happens at a ceremony."

Great. But I still needed to know – why is it called commencement? What I came to realize is that your degree is not the end of your journey, it is the beginning. Today's celebration is about commencing the next part of that journey. Doors will now be open to you that were not open before. But more importantly, you do not leave RVCC exactly the same person that you were on the day you walked in. If nothing changed, then we all did something wrong.

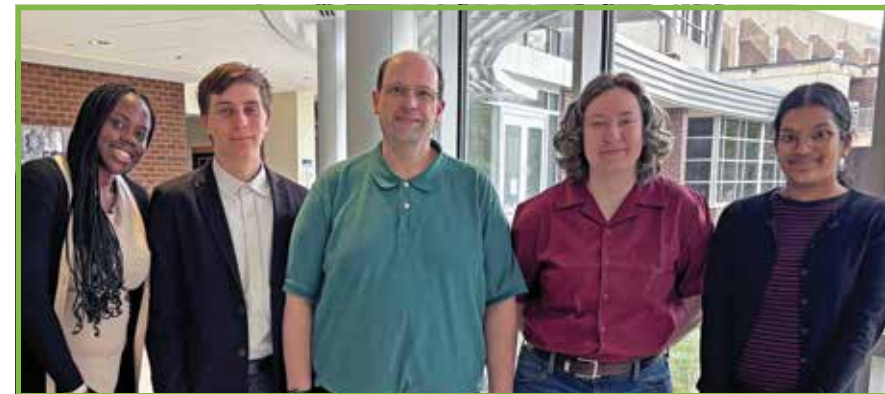
You learned content. You took courses that helped you to write an essay, evaluate double integrals or figure out how supply chains work

in the world of business. You learned how to write a lesson plan or how to stabilize a patient in distress.

But I hope you found something else here too. Maybe you found an interest that you never knew you had or a major that you never knew existed. Maybe something surprised you. You thought you wanted to be a second grade teacher, then one day you walked into the chaos of middle school to do an observation and realized you were at home there.

Maybe you came in here as the quiet high school graduate, and found a voice that you never knew you had. Or you graduated from high school and then 20 years later you decided to come back to college. And you wondered "can I do this?" Sitting here today confirms that you can, because you did it.

That doesn't mean your journey was easy. If it was, everyone would be a college graduate. You gave up those nights and weekends in order to study, to practice, to edit and to complete



assignments. You hit the "help me solve this" button more times than the Jets lost football games last season. But this morning, you realize that all that hard work is worth it.

Some of the math courses that I teach here are for preservice teachers, students who are studying to become teachers. So it's not surprising that one of the things I do outside of RVCC is mentoring student teachers going for certifications to teach middle and high school mathematics.

Last week, I was at a reception with my three student teachers from this semester who, I might add, have all accepted math teaching positions for next year before they graduated. If you're considering career paths, maybe it's worth giving fractions and variables a second chance.

We were talking about teaching. Teaching is one of those professions that everyone should try for at least a few days in their lifetime. It will give you a new perspective on so many things. At one time, my math courses for preservice teachers here involved writing a short lesson plan and then teaching the lesson. About 6 weeks into one of my classes, one student, who was not planning to be a teacher, had enough of all the teacher talk and asked the class "is anyone in here planning to become a teacher?" Then he looked surprised when all of the other students in the class raised their hands. This caused him to look at me and ask "how did I get into this class?" which honestly was a question that I had also been asking for about 6 weeks.

A couple weeks later, when I explained the teaching project, he said "so I just have to go up there and do what you do? That should be easy." As he went through the planning process, he had a lot of questions. Could he just go up there and wing it? (No) Did he really have to write his lesson plan down? (Yes) Did he really have to pick the example problems in advance? (Yes) Do

lesson plans really have a due date? (Yes)

His presentation went fine, and at the end, he told me he had a new respect for this teachers. He said to me "You really do this for every class? Do you know how much time this took me?" Yes. But as teachers, we spend the time, days nights and weekends, for that moment when you, the student, get it, when you are able to see yourselves being successful in courses or places where you had not been successful before. We also like when you ask those questions that we had never thought about which turns into a learning opportunity for us as well.

And we are proud of your accomplishments long after you graduate. Last month I saw that a former student of mine who was sitting in these seats just a few years ago, was named Teacher of the Year at her elementary school. There are also those moments when they introduce new faculty members here at RV and I realize they were once a student of mine. (Of course, I started teaching when I was really, really young).

So as someone who may have been teaching a little longer than I realized, what advice can I give to you as you commence your next journey?

Don't be afraid to start something just because it might not go perfectly. If the standard for teaching was perfection, I would not be here today. If every lesson had to be perfect, I would have never written my first lesson plan. Same is true about this speech.

Inspire others to take the journey that you did. Let them know that they can do it too. Show them by your actions that the hard things are worth doing, and are worth doing well.

Be open to new opportunities. For fun next week, ask people my age if they are doing the same thing now that they planned to do when they were in college or if they are in the same



job field as their first job. I'm guessing you'll get far more "no" answers than "yes."

Take a break each day from the world of your phones and go outside and talk to people face to face. Have civil conversations with people with whom you disagree, or with whom you have little in common rather than shouting matches online. Understand that you can form lasting friendships with people and still have very different views on politics, religion and whether it's Taylor Ham or Pork Roll. Look for the things that unite you rather than places where you disagree.

For the last few minutes, I've been talking about looking ahead to the next thing. I'm going to end with an exception to that advice. This morning, as your name is announced and you walk across the stage, pause for just a second to bask in the glow of your achievement. When the ceremony is done, go over to the reception area and talk with each other. Shake hands, take pictures. Take one with your whole family, one with your siblings, one with people you've taken classes with, and some with your professors too. Pause long enough to hear the accolades from family, classmates, professors and others around you.

When I passed my comprehensive exams and was admitted to candidacy, everyone on my committee sent me a nice long email with congratulations. All except Dr. Greenstein who was the head of the doctoral program at the time. He was a man of few words, and his emails were concise. He responded with three words. "Breathe it in." And that is my hope for you this morning as well. Take this moment and breathe it in. Today, you commence the next step of your incredible journey.

Congratulations to you, the RVCC Class of 2026.

College for me did start with “NO!” But I had to be honest with myself, I knew

Looking back, those “no’s” changed everything for me. Because you realize pretty quickly that growth doesn’t happen when everything goes your way. It happens when it doesn’t.

I arrived at RVCC as a first-generation student without knowledge of how to be a college student, where to start, and how to work with EduNav. At the time, I felt like I was behind, while everyone else had it all figured out. I was upset, but more than that, I felt guilty and embarrassed. But that forced me to take a step back and ask myself, what do I need to do to turn that No into a Yes?

So, I stepped it up. I started taking my classes more seriously, I started visiting those oddly timed student hours, and I started asking

more questions. I simply got involved. And, things started to change. Not just my grades but my mindset. Oprah Winfrey once said: “Surround yourself with only people who are going to lift you higher.” Well, I found those people just as motivated as I was.

Somewhere along the way, I stopped thinking about “getting through” college. I stopped doing things just to check a box. I started doing things that helped me grow. It helped me determine my values, my independence, and my confidence.

Through all of that, I realized something I’ve always believed in...capturing special moments. And TODAY, this... right here... is one of those spectacular moments. So before I give up this podium, I want to capture THIS moment.

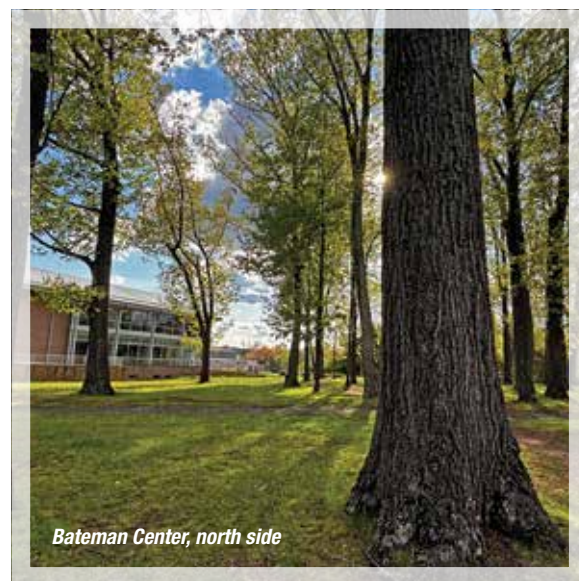
